LUTHERANS CLOSE SUCCESSFUL CELEBRATION

The celebration of the four hundredth anniversary of the Reformation which was held last week by the Lutherans of Western Nebraska closed a successful session Friday evening. The attendance was large and many delegates from adjoining towns enjoyed the meetings. President H. D. Hover, Ph. D. delivered the closing address taking for his subject "Reviving the Reformation." Mrs. Elizabeth Karr Langston and Earl Stamp directed the musical program which were well rendered and very much appreciated. The picnic at the city park on Friday afternoon was a success in every particular and two hundred were conveyed there by auto. Splendid lectures were given by Rev. F. S. Delo and Drs. Krueger and Bergin.

Draft Exemptions.
There seems to be considerable misunderstanding as to the powers and duties of the local boards under the selective draft law.

There are but two classes in which the action of the local board is final.

First—Those who fail to pass the physical examination receive their discharge from the board.

Second—Those that pass the physical examination and do not make any claim for exemption are certified for service by the board.

The local board have no jurisdiction of exemptions under the industrial occupation. These claims are passed upon by the district board that meets in Omaha.

Claims for exemption on account of dependent relatives are passed upon by the local board subject to review by the district board.

There is no provision in the law requiring the exemption of any drafted man on account of dependent relatives. The law places this matter in the discretion of the president and the local boards are governed in this matter by the rules and regulations made by the president.

Under these rules and regulations the local board cannot arbitrarily decide that a drafted man shall be excused from service, because he may have wife, children or dependent parents unless it further appears to their satisfaction that such dependents would become a public charge, in case he was taken.

Any person receiving notice that his claim for exemption on account of dependents has been denied by the local board has the right to appeal from the decision of the local board to the district board where he can present additional evidence to bring his case within the rule laid down by the president.

In all cases where the local board excuses a drafted man from service on account of dependents, the government automatically appeals from such decision to the district board.
