GOETHEBURG WIDOW MUST PAY FOR HER FLIRTATION St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 21.—(Special Telegram.)—Mrs. Jessie B. Bacon, wealthy and witty widow of Gothenburg, Neb., and one of the twin loves of Michael Joseph Hurley—the other was Baroness Ursula Barabara von Kallinowski; will pay heavily for her flirtation with the Webster Grove man, judging from a formal decree handed down today at Clayton by Judge Wurdeman. Here are the things Mrs. Bacon must do: Pay the South Webster Park Realty company \$8,916 which she borrowed and interest at 8 per cent from February 17 to August 11, 1917; pay attorneys for this concern fees amounting to \$1,500; pay Sam Hodgdon, a lawyer, \$175 fees and \$60 expenses incurred in a trip to Nebraska; return to Hurley a diamond ring valued at \$500, which he presented her in the Continental hotel, Paris, France, when they plighted their troth; and pay her own lawyers 10 per cent of the collateral of \$70,000 with which Mrs. Bacon secured the loan of \$8,916 and which was a second deed of trust on a ranch near Gothenburg, Neb.—Omaha Bee.
