British Death List.

For the past week the British war death list was 2,639, and the number reported wounded or missing 11,992. If the other principal countries engaged lose as heavily the death rate must exceed 2,000 a day and the wounded and missing more than 10,000 daily. All of which proves that war is hell.

Governor Neville says bootlegging must stop, especially in Omaha, where it has been running riot. In a conference with the Omaha officials this week the governor plainly told them that if they did not remove the police and officers who failed to do their duty he believed that he could and should do so.

Then and Now

When some of us were boys the United States government considered the expenditure of ten million dollars quite a sum, and such an appropriation resulted in considerable debate and opposition in congress. Now we are appropriating twenty-one billions of dollars to meet the cost of our first year's participation in the European war. But perhaps ten million represented as great a sum to the country fifty years ago as does twenty-one billion now. Then we were a million dollar country, now we are a billion dollar nation.

America the Food Dictator.

America today is the food dictator of the entire world. More stringent regulations governing exports were put into effect today and the department will make additional rulings as conditions make it necessary. The grip on Germany is being tightened by cutting off shipments of food stuff to neutral countries without consideration of their own needs for consumption. Since it has been found that the bulk of these shipments fell into German hands through neutral countries, they have been cut off almost entirely and the leak to Germany is effectively stopped. With this country consequently rests the food supply of the entire world.

Germany Ravaged by Disease.

Germany is suffering from an almost nation wide epidemic of dysentery, which the authorities are unable to cope with. The death rate has jumped from fifty to almost one hundred per cent since the first of the year and has increased in such alarming proportions during the past couple of months that the empire is shaken. Tuberculosis is ravaging the people, the death rate having increased enormously. The government has concealed all mortality figures for several months past in hope of keeping the results known from the people. The epidemic of dysentery is in great part due to the lack of proper food from which it is known the empire is suffering.
