Severe Hail Storm.

A strip of country about ten miles north of town was visited by a very heavy hail storm Saturday evening, which destroyed the growing corn and battered down and chopped off the grass. The track of the storm was about three miles wide and extended a number of miles north and south.

Scarcity of Houses.

Bratt, Goodman & Buckley say there is a scarcity of houses for rent, not a single desirable house on their list being vacant at this time, and has not been for a month past.

A member of the firm says that six or eight traveling men would make this city their headquarters if they could secure houses.

McDonald Sale Big Event.
No special sale ever held in North Platte has attracted a greater crowd of buyers than did the McDonald quitting business sale Saturday. From the moment the doors opened until midnight the jam was continuous and the dozen or more clerks were unable to wait on the trade. Dozens of customers, unable to secure a clerk, made their selections, wrapped their purchases and paid the money to the cashier. Others who could not be waited upon left to return at a time when the crush was not so great. The total sales for the day were probably the largest in the history of the city.

The crowd in the store at all hours yesterday was almost as great as Saturday.

This sale will continue until the stock is closed out.

Federal Court Meets Tomorrow.
Federal court, with Judge Woodrough on the bench, will convene in this city tomorrow. There is but one case on the docket, one a suit where the Union Pacific Co. seeks to eject Coker from land north of Sutherland, the other an arraignment of a man charged with failure to register. In the county jail there are eight men charged with failure to register. Whether they will be brought before the court by the district attorney is not at this time known in addition to these eight "slackers," Sheriff Salisbury will round-up five more in this county who are charged with failure to register.

Rincker and Clinton Leave
Ernest Rincker and "Jim" Clinton, who several months ago enlisted in the hospital corps of the navy, received orders Saturday to report at Omaha and left for that city at noon yesterday. From Omaha they will probably be sent to the Atlantic seaboard. Many friends were at the depot to see them off.

North Platte Boys in France.
Three North Platte boys are now in France, namely James Flynn, Willie Fred Stuart and John Burroughs. The latter two enlisted in San Francisco, where they had been making their home for several years. Each of the three is in the railroad engineering or maintenance corps, and form part of the body of 10,000 men who were sent abroad to help reconstruct and operate the railroads in England, France and Belgium.

Second Quota to Go September 19th.
Washington dispatches state that the second quota of the drafted men will be sent to the training camps September 19th. This quota will be forty per cent of the full draft and will take about forty-five men out of Lincoln county.

It is planned to call the remaining fifty-five per cent the early part of October. One Washington correspondent states that a second draft will be made in November, but this statement lacks confirmation.

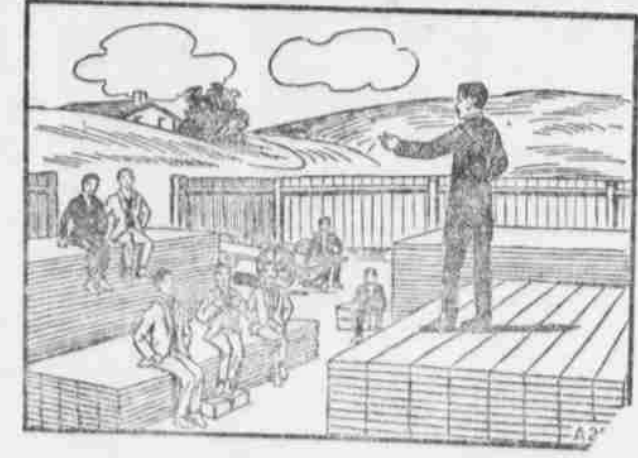
