Extension to Road No. 11.

To whom it may concern. The special commissioner appointed to locate a road as follows: Commencing at Station No. 11 of Road No. 11 in the SW 1/4 of Section 4, Twp. 14 N., Range 30 west of the 6th P. M., running thence in a northerly, northeasterly and northwesterly direction through the W 1/2 of said Section 4 and through the W 1/2 of Section 33, Twp. 15 N., Range 30, west to the northwest corner of said section 33, thence north on section line between Sections 28 and 29 of said last township and range three-fourths of a mile thence in a northeasterly, northerly and northwesterly direction through the NW 1/4 of said Section 28 and the SW 1/4 of Section 21 to the quarter section corner between Sections 28 and 21, Twp. 15 N., Range 30 west, thence north on line between Sections 20 and 21, 16 and 17, of said township and range to a point about 25 chains north of the corner of Sections 16, 17, 20 and 21, thence in a northeasterly direction through the W 1/2 of Sections 16 and 9, through the SW 1/4 and the E 1/2 of Section 4 of said last township and range to a point on the north line of said Section 4 about 20 chains west of the NE corner of said Section 4, thence northerly and westerly across Sections 33 and 28, Twp. 16, Range 30, to the section line between Sections 25 and 29, thence northerly along said section line between sections 28 and 29, and Sections 21 and 20 to a point about one-fourth of a mile south from the northwest corner of Section 21, and thence in a northwest direction across Sections 20 and 17 to the NW corner of Section 17, thence on a west and north direction across Sections 7 and 6 to a point on the north line of Section 6 about one-fourth of a mile east of the northeast corner of Section 6, has reported in favor of the same as follows:
