Mrs. John Sorenson passed away Sept. 23rd, after a prolonged illness caused by valvular heart trouble which for a number of years gradually reduced her to a very weak condition.

Lena Stoltenberg was born in Kell, Germany, July 31st, 1856, coming with her parents to Grand Island, Nebraska in 1864. Here she spent her girlhood and was married to John Sorenson November 21st, 1876, making North Platte her home for many years. In July, 1903, she and her family moved to Cheyenne, Wyo., remaining there until October, 1907, when she was compelled to move to Los Angeles on account of her health.

She was a charter member of the First Evangelical Lutheran church of North Platte, always a busy, earnest worker; instrumental in building the same. Her aim was to do good to all. She is survived by her husband and five children; Mrs. Minnie Fries, Omaha; Mrs. Anna Rankin, Los Angeles; Mrs. Ruby Hallett, Los Angeles; Edward Sorenson, Los Angeles and Dr. Alfred Sorenson, Chicago. She was laid to rest at Forest Lawn cemetery, a large gathering of friends attending, many being old North Platte friends.

### RED CROSS WILL SOON SHIP GOODS

The Red Cross Society will soon make a shipment of the goods on which they have so diligently worked during the past sixty or more days. The number of articles will run into the hundreds and include bed shirts, pajamas, operating gowns, dressings, knitted goods, and other articles needed by the wounded soldiers in hospitals.

Since July the society has had several work days each week, meeting in a room in the federal building. The average attendance of workers each day has been about fifteen; sometimes reaching twenty-five and with eight sewing machines in operation. In addition to the work done by the society in this city, there are branches at Maxwell, Brady, Hershey, Sutherland and other points. The Maxwell society brought up two big suit cases filled with articles last Saturday. The other towns have not yet sent in their donations.

In a few days auxiliaries to the North Platte society will be organized in town. There will be one formed in the Fourth ward to make some particular garment, the Baptist Sunday school will organize to make some other article, and the ladies' societies of the different churches will engage in the work as organizations. This formation of auxiliaries means getting more women interested and therefore a greater output of garments. With the soldier boys now enroute to the trenches, the demand for hospital clothing will soon be enormous, and every woman will need to her bit.
