NEW DAILY MAIL ROUTE TO NORTH SIDE IS GRANTED

Postmaster McEvoy received word yesterday that the application for a new daily mail route which will cover a large territory north of the river has been granted. This comes after five years of effort on the part of the postmaster and the people to be served.

The route goes east on Fourth street, serving families on that street not served by city delivery, crossing the Lincoln highway bridge and goes east to the former Macey place, thence north to the Purdy ranch, thence west along the foothills to the D. B. McNeel ranch, thence south to the south river road, thence east to the bridge and south on Locust, serving the houses on north Locust not covered by city delivery. In the neighborhood of one hundred families will be served. The service will begin as soon as the roads are repaired, boxes placed and other preliminary work completed.

Old No. 1 route, which runs up between the rivers will be consolidated with this new route, and one carrier will serve the entire district, and in doing so will cover sixty-three miles daily. The carrier will make the between the river route in the morning and upon his return will start out on the other route, which will be known as Motor Route B. The carrier, who now receives \$1200 a year will receive \$1800 when the routes are consolidated. The consolidation will call for an examination for carrier. Fred Spurrier is the carrier on Route One.

Freight is Slow.

Freight traffic on the Union Pacific is so heavy as to congest the yards at terminal points. The latter part of last week the conditions in the local yards were such as to keep the yardmen "up in the air." Sidetracks along the line are pretty well filled with cars and the movement of local freight is extremely slow. Delayed shipments of paper has caused The Tribune to cut out two pages and thereby omit much local news.

Travelers are warned against using the Lincoln highway for the first time west to the turn at the Pizer farm. The grader has been at work on this stretch of road, and through a breakdown of the grader, the road is not completed and is in bad shape. It is the intention to cover this road with gravel.

We notice that one class of Colorado coal has been advanced from \$2.70 at the mines to \$4.00, and this, under, and probably by consent, of the powers regulating coal prices. It is probable that the Doctor will approve, in which case the work will start early in the spring. Both upper floors will be built on the same level as the first floor, giving the additional rooms that are needed, and making a hotel just such as North Platte should and must later possess.

Standard Bores For Oil.
