### FILE DAMAGE SUITS AGAINST UNION PACIFIC

Twenty-six thousand dollars in damages are demanded from the Union Pacific railroad in five damage suits filed against this company Saturday by Attorney Wm. E. Shuman, on behalf of Mary H. Elder, Christina Samuelson, Emma Lierk, Hazel Lierk and Chas. Lierk, Jr., Jeneatte Picard and Theodore and Jessie Samuelson. These plaintiffs ask damages because they claim their homes have been destroyed by the location of the extensive coal yards just south of their properties. They allege that coal dust, smoke, soot, gases, continuous noises and excessive heat result from the operation of these coal yards, the clamor and the frequent fires, and that this coal dust, smoke, soot, gases and heat permeate the premises of the plaintiffs, ruining the houses and the furniture, clothing, etc., therein, destroys the trees and vegetation, and makes the members of the families ill. They say that these disagreeable conditions are caused by day and night, Sundays included, and have taken away all the comforts and enjoyment of their homes.

When it was first learned that the railroad intended to locate these coal yards in front of these residences, the owners protested and did all they could to prevent it, but having failed in this, they filed suits for the damages claimed by the different plaintiffs as follows: Theo. and Jessie Samuelson \$3,000; Lierk Estate \$3,000; Jeanette Picard \$6,500; Mary Elder \$8,000 and Christina Samuelson \$5,000. The cases will come up for trial at the December term of district court.

Snyder, of the state experimental farm, who visited the gardens during the growing season, filling the position of supervisor and judge. In an address to the audience, which well filled the floor of the auditorium, Mr. Snyder told of the gardens as he found them, and Mrs. J. S. Simms told in detail of the work of organizing the club, and some of the difficulties the committee had encountered.

Next year it is hoped to have the school children's gardens so financed that a paid supervisor may be employed. During the past season one hundred and twenty-one gardens were cultivated and some of the children sold as high as ten and fifteen dollars worth of vegetables from their patch of ground.

Interspersed during the evening was an excellently rendered concert solo by Earl Stamp, appreciated vocal solos by Miss White and Mr. Harrington and splendid readings by Miss Elsie Walmath and Mrs. M. J. Forbes.

Train Dispatcher R. L. Newbern, who left here a short time ago and went to Roseburg, Ore., has returned and resumed a trick in the local office.

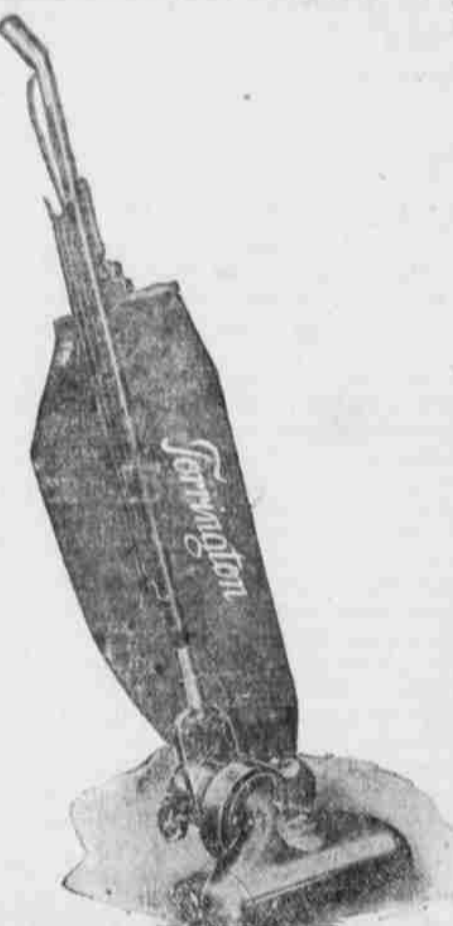
A special train bearing eastward a contingent of the national army, passed through yesterday forenoon. There were several hundred of them.
