New Firm Takes Buick Agency.
The manufacturers of the Buick car have cancelled their contract with the J. S. Auto Co. for the reason that the latter took the agency for the Nash, a car that for personal reasons is on the Buick proscribed list; that is, no agent can handle both make of cars. The agency has been turned over to Durvall & Chorpennig, who operate a garage at Cozad but who will open a garage in this city, having secured a lease of the Lloyd opera house until such time as a new building can be constructed. The business here will be in charge of A. Duvall as manager, and he expects to become a permanent resident of the city. Frank Chorpennig, the other member of the firm and who was formerly connected with a North Platte garage, will remain in charge of the Cozad plant. The firm expects to have the opera house in readiness the latter part of next week to house cars, give Buick service and install a stock of repairs.

The officers elected in the temporary Farm Bureau organization are: Henry Frels, Hershey, president and Frank Strollberg, North Platte, secretary. At this meeting it was also recommended that a county-wide meeting be held sometime in the near future.

Funeral services were held at the Steel home Friday and interment was made in the North Platte cemetery. The wife of the deceased died fifteen years ago.
