Mrs. Charles Pass Departs Life. Mrs. Mary Pass, wife of Charles Pass died at her home Monday night at 11:15 after an illness of several months. Death was due to stomach and kidney trouble which followed an attack of grippe .contracted last January. During her illness she was taken to Dr. Jonas at Omaha, and to the Mayo Bros. at Rochester, Minn., but these physicians could give no hope of recovery.

The funeral was held yesterday forenoon from the Catholic church, of which Mrs. Pass had been a lifelong and faithful member. Many friends were present to pay their last tribute to this splendid home-loving woman
