Mrs. Charles Pass Departs Life.

Mrs. Mary Pass, wife of Charles Pass died at her home Monday night at 11:15 after an illness of several months. Death was due to stomach and kidney trouble which followed an attack of grippe contracted last January. During her illness she was taken to Dr. Jonas at Omaha, and to the Mayo Bros. at Rochester, Minn., but these physicians could give no hope of recovery.

The funeral was held yesterday forenoon from the Catholic church, of which Mrs. Pass had been a lifelong and faithful member. Many friends were present to pay their last tribute to this splendid home-loving woman.

The deceased was born in Toronto Can., March 25, 1848. July 7, 1881, she was united in marriage to Mr. Pass who had come over from England six months before to visit relatives. Immediately following the wedding Mr. and Mrs. Pass moved to Dubuque, Ia., where they remained four years, coming to this city in 1885, which has since been their home. To this union three children were born, Amy who died in infancy, Chas. J., of this city, and Leo, of Washington, D. C.

Mrs. Pass was a woman of wonderful activity and while in her earlier life she devoted considerable time to church work, she was distinctly a home-loving woman, and to her indefatigable energy is due much of the success in building up the Pass floral business to its present magnitude.

Not only to members of her family was Mrs. Pass kind and considerate, but this characteristic extended to all her acquaintances—she was greatly attached to them and to the city which had been her home for so many years. A truly good woman has gone and there are many who regret her passing.
