

First German Prisoner Dies

The first German prisoner of war taken by the American expeditionary forces died in an American field hospital, having been shot when he encountered an American patrol in Noman's land in front of the American trenches. He, with another German. was discovered by the patrol and was called upon to halt. The Germans ran; the patrol fired and one of the enemy was hit. The prisoner was removed to a field hospital, where the combined efforts of several surgeons failed to save his life.

The prisoner was a mail carrier and letters of some value were found on him. He explained his presence near the American trenches saying he had lost his way in the dark. He declared that the German soldiers did _not know that Americans were on the front or in France, the officers telling American batteries are continuing


