NAVY AND ARMY LIFE IS NOT ALL DREDDGERY

Robert Duncan, who is in Uncle Sam's navy, has sent the following letter to the North Platte Sammys Girls: The first thing in the making of a sailor or a soldier is the transformation from a civilian to a "rookie."

After deciding (when you have your own choice) of whether you will join the navy or army, the first thing is to consult the recruiting officer, who will give you a preliminary examination. If it is not a regular recruiting station, if the candidate passes a successful examination, and it is at a sub-station they are given orders to report at a station for training, having their necessary traveling expenses paid by the government.

After being outfitted the "rookie" or "rookies" as the case may be, are sent to the detention camp so that any contagious disease they might have may be detected and prevent spreading to all on the station. The medical officers in the regular navy are very efficient and can detect most any contagious disease at sight. Every recruit must stand inspection every day, and some that are not exactly recruits, but it is for the one purpose to check their conditions. Upon reporting to the Detention Camp the "rookies" are assigned to companies of one hundred men to each company. A Chief Petty officer detailed as Company commander for drilling the recruits then takes charge of them and assigns them to tents.

Of course, all is not pleasure. Bags, hammocks and bedding, as well as clothes must be kept clean and must be scrubbed when the order is given. All orders must be obeyed at once and all work together for the good and one purpose of the "GLORY OF THE STARS AND STRIPES."

Russia Temporarily Out of War Washington.—Officials of the Russian embassy has announced that allies must bear the burden of fighting Germany, that Russia can no longer be depended upon to give them support, other than moral. The withdrawal of Russia from the giant conflict, it is stated, is only temporary, but she will be unable to take active military participation in the war for the winter at least. No separate peace will be negotiated with Germany. That assurance is given by the ambassador, but the country, worn out by a hard struggle against superior arms and the victim of mismanagement at home, cannot prolong the fight actively.

The uniform of the day is always announced each day by the Officer of the Day, and you cannot wear just what you want, as everything must be according to regulations. Whenever it is cool nights, it is no uncommon sight to see a guard on duty with a blanket wrapped around his shoulders, which looks like a "ghost," but after being in the service for a time the shakiness which usually accompanies such a vision disappears and you begin to feel for a pass when you see the white object and hear his order to "halt."

The officers in command are very liberal to those who try to do the right thing and be governed by such orders as are necessary. Hiking parties are formed and given liberty from Saturday noon until Monday morning (9:55) when they must report back to the station for duty. The party is issued rations for the time they are out, and it is surely some sport to have the pleasure of hiking when deprived of it for a time. Dances are held quite often on evenings which are not liberty evenings, and a certain number will be granted liberty for the social affairs. It is amusing to see the husky young lads of the land on shore leave. If a few are waiting for a car, or walking up the streets they are always happy, singing, laughing and enjoying themselves to the fullest extent, as that is what the liberty is for. I may be partial to the Navy, but the "jacksies" seem to be a more happy bunch of men than the men in the Army. One reason is that all of the men in the navy are the hot-blooded men who thought it would be a quicker means of seeing active service in joining the Navy than the Army and the "Volunteers", while so many of the Army were asked to do their bit. The joy of any line of work is "doing before being asked", therefore the reason for the happiness of the "jacksies".

At first, that is after the present conflict had arisen, more attention was given to the Army boys or soldiers than to the sailors, but even the soldiers admit that the sailors have the advantage of them in being more sociable, happier, and more easily to approach and get acquainted with. The sailors get more applause because of get acquainted, he takes a chance. In so many of the recent parades which are being held in most every city, the sailors get more applause because of their cheerfulness. Usually while marching to some good music of the variety of "Oh Boy! Oh Joy!" "Where do we go from here?" the sailors are singing at the tops of their voices and making the very best of it. It is just the same way in their work, when the company commanders and officers-in-charge will permit it. It creates a greater feeling of friendliness between officers and men than ordinarily exists.

One of the Chief Petty officers plays with a team of men under his instruction on a football team, and all like him so well that when he had his birthday, "wifey" giving the news to the team and the "number" of his residence, as he lives ashore, the team bought him a nice birthday present, his wife a box of candy, and had swell surprise party. All of the boys got into the house all right while he was down town on an errand, and when he came home they let out an awful yell which "got his goat." Everyone enjoyed it, and he will do all for the men that he possibly can. On returning back to the station the men entertained a party of onlookers and other people who were also waiting for the car with songs, yells, etc. It was near midnight but everybody was happy and enjoying themselves to the utmost.
