FORM DISTRICT AT BRADY FOR A NEW BRIDGE.

The county commission ra while in session, upon petition of the necessary number of freeholders, created a new bridge district for the purpose of voting bonds for the construction of a series of five state aid bridges across the Platte river south of Brady.

The district takes In the east three miles of Cottonwood precinct and all of Gaslin, Peckham and Jeffrey precincts south of the river and includes a large strip of territory north of the river. The amount of bonds will be \$30,000, which is one half the estimated cost of the proposed structures. It is intended to locate the bridges 300 or 400 yards below those now in use, of which there are four, all of which have just about outlived their service after more than twenty-five years of heavy traf-These new bridges will be of con-
