### WATER PLANT WILL BE OUT OF DEBT SOON

The city water plant, which at one time was about \$20,000 in the red, will be out of debt by December first. For two or more years past the plant has been netting the city from eight to ten thousand dollars a year, and these net earnings have been applied to paying off the indebtedness, when perhaps part should have been expended for repairs and extensions. Commissioner Welch, however, having been handicapped by unpaid bills ever since the city took over the plant, was distressed in getting on a pay as you go basis, and after December first will have attained this end.

Beginning with the new year the water department will be in position to make much-needed extensions of mains, thus serving residents who have been entitled to water service for several years past but could not be given such on account of the financial straits.

It is believed that there will be available for extensions and repairs eight or ten thousand dollars a year, and this sum each year for a period of five years will place the plant in Al condition and make all extensions necessary.

### Some Apples.

Tim Hanfin presented The Tribune yesterday with two apples from a box he had received from the orchard of W. M. Chambers of Trinidad, Wash., a former resident of North Platte. These apples are of the Stayman Winesap variety and it required but eighteen of them to fill the bushel box. They are the largest as well as the cleanest looking apples we have ever seen.

### PUT BACK POLICEMAN ON THE NORTH SIDE

At the meeting of the city council Tuesday evening, it was decided to maintain a policeman in the Fourth ward. This officer, in the interests of economy, was taken off some time ago with the understanding that two men could patrol the entire city. This was found, however, to be unsatisfactory as the town is too large to be patrolled by one day and one night man. Amos Foster was appointed to do the north side work.

The council decided to buy for the sum of \$400 the Jeffries blacksmith shop building located on the city lot on Front street. This building will be used as a storehouse for the city tractor, the graders and other machinery which otherwise would need to stand out and be exposed to the weather.

The street commissioner was authorized to haul and store 150 loads of sand and gravel for use on the streets next spring. It often happens that in the early spring when dirt is unobtainable certain streets need a few loads to repair ad fill up holes. By having a storage supply the needed repairs can be made.

A good part of Tuesday evening's session was devoted to auditing and allowing bills.
