TWO BILLION WAR FUND

Treasury officials went to work yes-terday on plans for the newly announced campaign to gather for war purposes two billion dollars of small savings within a year beginning December 3, through a system of selling thrift stamps, war savings stamps and war savings certificates. In virtually every bank, postoffice, railroad station, school and retail store in the country these stamps will be placed on sale, for the double purpose of encouraging the saving habit and obtaining money in small sums not available through sale of liberty bonds. Frank Vanderlip, New York banker, who directing the war savings movement, announced that directors of the campaign and advisory committees have been appointed for every state.




