REGISTERED MEN CANNOT ENLIST AFTER DEC. 15.

After noon, December 15, registered men will not be allowed to enlist voluntarily in the military or naval service of the United States. Except in the following cases this rule is emphatic:

"Upon presentation to a recruiting officer of a certificate by his local board to the effect that his class and order number are so low that he is not within the current quota of his local board, any registrant may enlist voluntarily in the navy or marine corps, and thereafter, upon presentation by the registrant to his local board of a certificate of a commissioned officer of the navy or marine corps stating that he has been so enlisted, such certificate shall be filed.

Word has been received by the Red Cross society that the societies of Nebraska are to furnish Forts Crook and Omaha with all knitted goods needed. Just now what is needed most are sweaters; so there is an urgent call for all sweaters in the hands of the knitters to be turned in as soon as possible. Every one is urged to finish what they have on hand and start on more, knitting sweaters especially.

\$16,000 a Minute.

Referring to the statement that the Treasury Department is spending approximately two billion a month for war purposes, or about \$46,000 a minute, Leslie's Illustrated Weekly says: "The expenditures for last month reached a total of only a little more than a billion, but the Government had not struck its pace as a world's champion coin dispenser when these records were tabulated. It staggers the imagination to hear that a nation is getting rid of money at the rate of \$766 a second, but even these amazing figures will give little comfort to Berlin if the Kaiser's financial experts carry the problem in arithmetic to a logical conclusion. It is estimated that the wealth of the United States amounts to \$250,000,000,000. Consequently, the American Government could throw away its two billion dollars a month for another ten years before exhausting its last cent. As a matter of fact, however, the two billion dollars a month is going back into circulation in this country almost as rapidly as it is raised by taxation and Liberty bonds. America has more than \$3,000,000,000 in the Allies, but all this money is being spent in the United States. For that reason, ten years of war, instead of totally exhausting the nation's wealth, would leave the Government quite enough to go ahead with the big job it has undertaken. It is, largely, a matter of bookkeeping, as well as a case of making a book on the Entente against the Terton field.

Chance for Ingenuity.

The windy western plains will be interested in a coal conservation device proposed by Black Diamond, a journal of the coal trade. When the wind blows, says this journal, the consumption of coal may be doled with out adding greatly to the heat generated in the house. This heat is carried out by the strong draft through the chimney. The remedy is a wind-controlled damper or check draft. By either device the draft is kept uniform by automatic adjustment of the smoke pipe to the velocity of the wind, and the waste by way of the chimney prevented. We are assured that such a device can be installed at the cost of one month's saving of coal. At current prices every shovelful of coal saved makes a material difference in the weight of a householder's purse. Consumers may feel like exercising their ingenuity in cheating Nebraska winds of the heat they have been extracting through Nebraska chimneys.—State Journal.

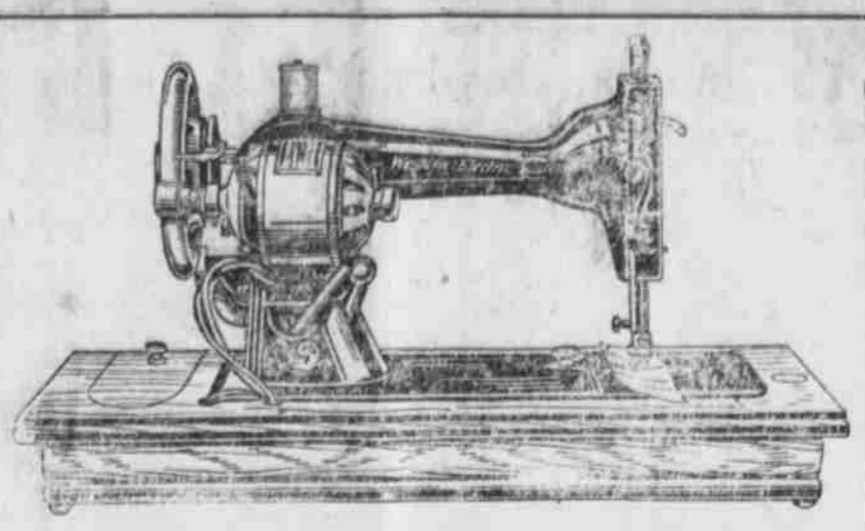
