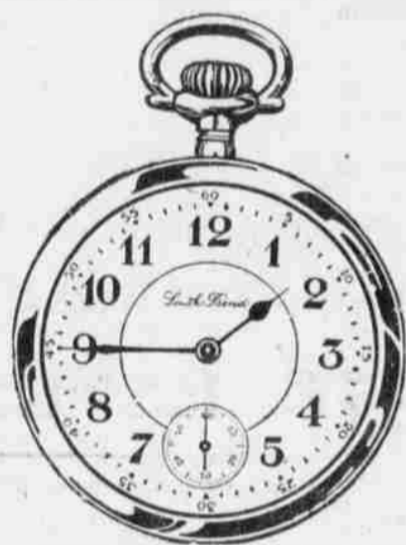

TRAIN NO. 7 KILLS AND MAIMS 42 CATTLE.

Train No. 7, Geo. A. Austin engineer, killed and maimed forty-two head of cattle at Buda Tuesday evening. A feeder living near that place had shipped in two cars of feeders, about fifty head, and after unloading them at the stock yards attempted to drive them over the crossing. The owner had been warned to look out for approaching trains, but he apparently heeded not the advice for he drove them on the track just in time for No. 7's engine, moving fifty-five miles an hour, to plow into them, with the result that forty-two of the fifty were either killed or maimed. So great was the impact that one of the steers was thrown against the block signal post with such force as to break off the post, which was embedded in a cement foundation. Just how the cattle managed to bunch themselves so that so many were hit, is hard to determine. The front of the engine was a mass of blood and hair. The speed of the engine is the only thing that saved a derailment and a bad wreck.

Engineer Austin has been running an engine for forty years, but never before had he caused such havoc to a bunch of cattle.
