#### State Fuel Administrator Kennedy Wednesday announced the provisions of the new electric light order. The order applies to Thursday and Sunday nights of each week.

"Merchant's signs, theatre signs, ornamental lighting on buildings, display advertising, notices and announcements, are cut out.

"Lights inside stores, offices or other when not open for business, excepting such lights as are necessary for safety.

"Signs designating the location of nature of the business, when not open for business, are prohibited.

"Excessive street lighting, intended for display or advertising purposes, is prohibited, whether maintained by private or public authority.

'Householders are urged to observe Thursday and Sunday nights, and burn as few lights as possible."


