PLAN REGISTERING WOMEN FOR WORK ON FARMS

National registration of women available for work on farms is planned by the Department of Labor as one of the advance steps in a campaign to obtain a sufficiency of farm labor for every section of the country during the coming season.

A. L. Berkman, chief of the division of farm service, announced that every effort will be made to meet the expected shortage of farm labor by a plan to mobilize the available men and women in every community in the country.

A special farm service man will be stationed in each of the 95 federal employment agencies of the country, Mr. Berkman said, and in addition, postoffices in the small farming communities will be used as recruiting stations, the postmaster or some other representative citizen acting as community labor agent.

"The most serious farm labor shortage last year was in the east," said Mr. Berkman. "The industries there filling war orders took men who otherwise would have been available for farm work by the offer of attractive wages. The farmers will have to increase wages more than they have to get men to come from the cities. They have not raised wages anywhere in proportion to their increase in profits."

Women, Mr. Berkman continued will be needed for truck gardening, fruit gardening, dairying and other light forms of labor, but they will not be called upon for the heavy work so long as men are available.

"The college girls and women of the leisure classes who are ready to respond to a call for workers as a matter of part-time service," Mr. Berkman said, "must be depended upon chiefly for the woman labor that will be needed."

WAR NOTES

Red Cross appropriations for work in Italy from November 1, 1917, to May 1, 1918, total \$4,771,990.

Four tons of shipping capacity are required to transport a soldier, and another ton is necessary for his equipment. In addition, it takes 50 pounds of ship capacity a day to keep him supplied with food, clothing and ammunition.

A million checks a month will soon be going forward from the bureau of war-risk insurance to safeguard America's fighting forces and families. Applications for soldiers and sailors for insurance are near \$4,000,000,000.

The number of women employed in munition factories has increased from 2,500 in 1910 to more than 100,000 in 1917, according to a report made to the National League of Women's Service, and 1,266,000 women are engaged in industrial work which is directly or indirectly necessary to carry on the war.

A recent comparison of health reports from troops in the United States and the Expeditionary Forces shows the admission rate to hospitals to be greater among the men in France. Admissions to hospitals in one week in the Expeditionary Forces figured on a basis of 1,000 men, were 45.2; in the United States, the rate was 32.7 per 1,000 men. In the overseas forces the non-effective rate (the total number of men excused from duty for any injury or ailment, whether or not ordered to hospital) was 54.1 per 1,000; in the troops in the United States it was 46.4.

A statement by the Provost Marshal General shows that of 859,150 total discharges for dependency 743,141, or 86.50 per cent, were for wife or child and children; widowed parent, 6.51 per cent; infant parent, 5.75 per cent; motherless child, 0.66 per cent; minor orphan brothers and sisters, 0.58 per cent. Of the total of 1,057,263 men certified for service in the National Army 418,309, or 39.55 per cent, are listed as involuntary conscripts—those who failed to appear or filed unsuccessful claims for exemption or discharge. Voluntary conscripts—those who filed no claims for exemption or discharge—numbered 639,954.

We have seen and heard much of the proposal of "100,000 airplanes" to be provided by the United States within the next year. In a country where one great industry produces 1,500,000 motor cars per year, the fabrication of 100,000 planes might seem easy, but actual figures based upon three years of practical experience in the war show that there are now between 40 and 50 men of the auxiliary services required for each active machine at the front. If this same ratio should be adhered to in our service, it would mean that some 4,000,000 men would be required in our aeronautical department on foreign soil between our ports of embarkation and the fighting front.

Substitutes for Flour
The Lincoln Journal states that the food administrator has enumerated the following as substitutes for flour:
Corn meal
Corn starch
Corn grits
Corn flour
Hominy
Barley flour and whole barley
Rye and rye flour
Oat meal (rolled oats)
Buckwheat flour
Potato flour (not potatoes)
Sweet potato flour
Soya of bean flour (not beans)
Pteridita flour

The food administration has made no ruling on corn flakes and certain other cereals. For the present, these will not be included as substitutes for white flour.

NEBRASKA FARMERS WILL PRODUCE MORE PORK

Nebraska has gone over the top in its pork producing campaign well on to fifty per cent. Not content with giving Uncle Sam what he asked for, at least 4,000 Nebraska farmers have agreed to a third to a half bigger increase than was originally planned. Records compiled by the agricultural extension service show that farmers in this state have rallied to the program by agreeing to raise on an average nearly thirty per cent more hogs instead of the twenty per cent that the government requested.

The eighteen special workers which the government appointed sixty days ago to start the campaign went off the road Friday and called their part of the work done. The office in Lincoln, in charge of Prof. Kenneth Warner, will remain open during the spring, however, and the remainder of the campaign will be concentrated in work accomplished by the Lincoln office.

Definite answers have been received from 4,000 farmers in Nebraska, who will breed on an aggregate 34,000 more sows this winter. Each man who replied on the card gave the number of sows bred last year and the number he will breed this year. These cards show an average increase of nearly thirty per cent over last year. The national significance of the announcement is realized when one recalls that the government asked for an average increase of only fifteen percent in the entire country, and Nebraska has nearly doubled that.
