Next Draft in June.

Washington.—The next draft of men will come in June, according to present plans of the war department. This information was given out by Marshal Crowder. Some calls will be issued here and there for men over the entire country, to fill places in the camps where vacancies have been created, but the second draft call will not be made until June. The exact numbers of men to be drafted at that time has not been determined, but as all cantonment camps should be ready to receive their full quota then it is expected the call will be for close to one million men.

10,000 Soldiers March.

A parade of 10,000 troops from the Seventy-seventh division of the national army at Camp Upton—part of the "Metropolitan division"—was the distinguishing feature of the Washington's birthday celebration in New York.

The city outdid itself in displaying the national colors, and Fifth avenue, the principal line of march for the parade, was a waving lane of red, white and blue. The reviewing officers included Secretary of the Navy Daniels, Brigadier General Evan M. Johnson, commanding the Seventy-seventh division, and various state and municipal officers.

Wheat to Remain at \$2.20.

A price of \$2.20 a bushel—the same as for last year's crop—was fixed by President Wilson Saturday night for the coming season's wheat yield. The price is for No. 1 northern spring wheat at Chicago, with a scale of differentials for other markets. The differentials differ to a slight extent from those now operative and range from a minimum of \$2 to a maximum of \$2.28. In fixing a price now for the new crop, which will not be harvested until June, the president was believed to have had two objects in view. The first was to halt legislation pending in congress to fix prices at from \$2.25 to \$3, and the other was to stimulate spring planting.

The introduction of the price-raising bills had begun to shock the flow of wheat to market, and food administration officials feared that mills soon would have to close down. Hoping the legislation would pass, farmers, it is declared, have been refusing to sell at the present price of \$2.20.
