During his last illness, dating Nov. 15th, 1917, he was lovingly and tenderly cared for by his three daughters until his daughter Carrie Childs, of Denver, was called to her home on account of the Illness and death of her husband which occured just one week before her father's death and their bodies were laid to rest on the Lord's day just one week apart.
