NEBRASKA IS ORGANIZED FOR NEXT LIBERTY LOAN.

Organization throughout the state for the sale of the third Liberty loan bonds is practically completed.

"It is apparent now that the campaign will start soon," announces T. C. Byrne, state chairman. "There is no exact information yet as to the date, or what the size of the offering will be, but we feel sure the amount to be sold is between \$6,000,000,000 and \$9,000,000,000. Recent offerings of treasury certificates would indicate that the rate will be 4 1/2 per cent." Since this statement it is announced that the drive will begin April 6th.

"Nebraska is ready to do its part again," said O. T. Eastman, manager of the Omaha branch of the Federal Reserve bank. "No matter how big Nebraska's quota is the experience of the state committee indicates that it will be taken. The very real serious problem in the interest of the commerce of the country, is to have the subscription well distributed among the people."

E. F. Folds, secretary of the state committee, said: "It is absolutely essential that the bonds be generally distributed. The banks have proven that they are behind the government to the limit, but banking assets must be held liquid so that the banker in every community can take care of the business of his depositors and borrowers, because it will be necessary to create a credit that you can loan to your government. There is not enough cash on hand or available funds to absorb the entire loan."

Rounding Up the Slackers.

Last week the Keith county council of defense rounded up several 'slackers' and issued mandates to them. Rev. Behrends was ordered to organize a Red Cross chapter in his church and community and engage in the Lutheran war work activities, and take part in Y. M. C. A. and other work. Dirk Harms was ordered to purchase War Savings stamps in the sum of \$1,000, and contribute \$10 to Red Cross and \$15 to the Y. M. C. A. or Lutheran war fund. Chris Blander was directed to buy \$500 worth of stamps, contribute \$25 to the Red Cross and Y. M. C. A., and notify his father that he, too, must do the same. Chas. Harmon must buy \$1,000 worth of stamps and donate \$20 to the war societies. Hugh Brogan, Sr., was ordered to buy \$100 worth of stamps and pay \$20 to the war societies.

All telephone companies in Keith county were notified not to give service or connections to those who talk over the lines in the German or Austrian languages.

We are glad to see this action taken by the Keith county council of defense. The Lincoln county council is now preparing its cards preparatory to a campaign that will bring to the surface those who have not in the past been doing their "bit."

Obituary.

John S. Larson was born August 21st, 1845, at Somerset, Somerset county, Penn., and departed this life Feb. 21st, 1918, in North Platte, Neb., at the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. S. Davis after an illness of fourteen weeks.

He was 72 years and 6 months old. On July 3, 1867, he was united in marriage to Miss Sylvia Messenger at Waterloo, Ia. To this union was born three daughters, Sylvia L. Peck and Carrie E. Childs of Denver, Colo., and Mary E. Davis of North Platte, Neb. He moved with his family from Waterloo, to Walnut Grove, Neb., Oct. 2d, 1882. In the fall of 1888 he removed to Cozad, where he lived until the death of his companion, April 10th, 1914. Since that time he has lived with his daughters.

During his last illness, dating Nov. 15th, 1917, he was lovingly and tenderly cared for by his three daughters, until his daughter Carrie Childs, of Denver, was called to her home on account of the illness and death of her husband which occurred just one week before her father's death and their bodies were laid to rest on the Lord's day just one week apart.

The deceased was a soldier in the Civil war, being mustered into service Sept. 20th, 1861, as a drummer boy of Company I, 55th regiment Penn. Infantry, and served his country nearly four years. He was in fifteen general engagements and escaped uninjured. Through his wife's prayers and Christian influence, who was converted in 1880 and since then he had been a faithful member and ardent worker of the Methodist church until called to his great reward.

He leaves to mourn his loss three daughters, six grand children, four great grand children and one half sister, Mrs. E. A. Shaulis, of Cozad.

During his life he made many friends by his cheerful and kind disposition, and he will be greatly missed by all who knew him and especially by his daughters and grandchildren as it was always a real pleasure for him to lighten their work and brighten their lives.

A short service was held at the Davis home in North Platte, Sunday morning by Rev. B. A. Cram of the M. E. church, after which the body was taken to Walnut Grove church where funeral services were conducted by Rev. E. E. Carter of the Cozad M. E. church of which the deceased was a member for about thirty years.

His body was laid to rest in Walnut Grove cemetery beside the body of his beloved wife.

AN ERA OF INFLATION NOW ON ITS WAY.

A multiplicity of signs appear from every avenue of industrial endeavor throughout the country indicating that a still higher price era is ahead of the country. The farmers are dissatisfied with \$2.20 wheat and want \$3 per bushel; labor is steadily pressing for better wages, and what is more, is getting it or will get it; the cost of new capital is rising and some interests from necessity are compelled to pay 7, 8, and even 10 per cent for accommodations. Manufacturers complain that they must increase prices to meet the advance in raw material. The government itself is headed toward the expenditure of from \$15,000,000,000 to \$20,000,000,000 this year, and despite drastic attempts to regulate prices the tendency of costs is straight upward. Foodstuffs are from 60 to 100 higher than pre-war levels. The next Liberty loan will bear a 4 1/2 per cent interest rate instead of 4 per cent.

There is justification for the demand for higher wages and for adding to the price of everything manufacturers have to sell. Raw material is becoming scarcer on account of the scarcity of labor, rising wages, inadequate production and inordinate demand. The railway heads this week admitted freely before the railroad commission that numerous classes of railroad employees were not adequately paid and should have better wages—New York Financial World.

Townley in the Tolls.

No surprise need be occasioned by the arrest of A. C. Townley, national president of the Non-Partisan League by officers of the United States government, charged with conspiracy to influence American citizens to not enlist in the war against Germany. It is not probable that the government would risk an arrest without sufficient evidence to sustain its charges.

The Non-Partisan League was organized a few years ago in North Dakota by this man Townley and a few associates, and last year cleaned up everything politically worth while in that state. Townley appears to have been something of an adventurer, and has recently gone through the bankruptcy court with liabilities of about one-third of a million as against assets amounting to only five hundred dollars.

It is not believed that in the beginning the Non-Partisan League was intended to be a non-patriotic organization, but there is a lurking and growing suspicion that it has been seized upon by German propagandists with the intention of using it to create a serious diversion in the farming state of the middle west, and that its purpose further has been to draw into its organization pro-German farmers. A careful scrutiny of the membership in Nebraska, so far as the same is known, shows the presence of many well intentioned farmers whose patriotism and loyalty are not questioned, but appears to be just as true that it has drawn almost to a man upon those who are in sympathy with Germany, and not in sympathy with America in this war. This may be merely circumstantial, but it is nevertheless significant.

The speech that brought Senator LaFollette into disrepute was made at St. Paul upon the invitation of the Non-Partisan League. The result was that LaFollette was everywhere and at once branded "traitor," and the organization that sponsored him has been under suspicion, with occasional investigations by the national and state councils of defense of parties charged with disloyal or unpatriotic sentiments. These expressions have however as a rule been carefully guarded and members have generally been very reticent regarding the League's affairs.

It is known that the L. W. W. is financed with German money. If the same should be found to be true of the Non-Partisan League the government will very quickly put an end to the activities of its promoters.—Kearney Hub.
