### U. S. NOT FRIENDLY TO JAPAN ENTERING RUSSIA.

Washington.—Through allied channels the United States has officially declared that this country does not consent to the intervention by Japan in Siberia. The allies have in turn informed Japan that the stand taken by America is not one of protest, merely the filing of information, in friendly fashion, that the United States does not claim at this time that intervention in the far east is advisable.

It is known that Japan is ready to strike and has mobilized her troops, ready to enter Siberia and settle the differences there. For months this preparation has been going on, Japan awaiting the allies' sanction. It is thought that the United States feels that Russian internal difficulties may still be straightened out and thus avoid a collision of forces in the far east and a reservation of Japanese energies for action later.

Items of Interest to Farmers.

**Pinto Beans.**  
The government is sending out a call for pinto beans for seed. It has a contract with a local dealer to buy choice re-cleaned beans for 8 cents. Anyone interested, address County Agent office.

**Seed Corn Week.**  
It would surprise you the number of farmers I have met who are planning to settle their seed corn problem next week, as the government urges every farmer to co-operate with it in this matter in order that Uncle Sam as well as the farmer may turn attention to other things.

**Machinery and Repairs Short.**  
Because of the high price of machinery and the uncertainty of business, implement dealers are not loading up with machinery and repairs as usual. Shake a leg boys, and order your new machinery and repairs for this season now. Make the most of your time. If you are busy now what will it be like later on, yet that old lister must have its lay sharpened.

**Seed Corn.**  
There is probably over thirty thousand bushels of old corn suitable for seed in this county. The price ranges from \$3.00 to \$5.00 per bushel. Besides this there is much new corn, which was cut before the frost, from which it will be possible to select seed. There is clearly a surplus in this county, but as soon as the embargo is lifted we can depend upon it that most of this will go elsewhere or be shelved for feed, leaving the last minute men to rustle seed where they can, and in the meantime blaming the County Agent for not looking after them. Get your seed corn now; men, test it, and have it over with.

The people east of Hignell are getting anxious to start an organized fight on gophers this season.

### Railroad Net Revenues.

Operating revenues of one hundred and fifty of the larger railroads of the country for December was \$288,103,445 as compared with \$267,444,682 for December, 1916, according to reports received by interstate commerce commission. Expenses of the roads during December were \$217,800,210, against \$182,116,075 for the corresponding month in 1916. Net revenue of the same roads totaled \$70,293,235, as compared with \$85,528,607 for December, 1916.
