EDITORIAL MISCELLANY

The purchasing of Liberty Bonds is a patriotic duty and should represent savings and the ability to invest. They should not be offered for the satisfaction of obligations unless absolutely necessary.

Let us have no frenzy in placing the coming Liberty Loan. Let us not sell an individual beyond his means. Let us have no come backs which will cause embarrassment.

The National Committee of Patriotic Societies, Washington, D. C., is offering a \$50 Liberty Bond for a prize essay on "There should be a bond in every home." This contest is open to high schools which put on a campaign for the sale of Liberty Bonds.

The slogan of the coming Liberty Loan campaign is "Your share is fair."

Every man who buys a third Liberty Bond wants to do his part, but he does not want to make good the deficiency of a financial slacker.

The National Credit Men's Association advises strongly against the acceptance of Liberty Loan bonds for the payment of obligations and offering them on the open market.

Every man, woman and child, who can purchase Liberty Loan bonds from savings should do so in order that the banks will not have to tie up too large a portion of their loanable funds which would cause business stagnation.

Let business men ponder seriously and prevent the embarrassment which will follow if the coming Liberty Loan is not placed with all the people.

United States 4 per cent bonds in 1901 brought 139% on the stock market. Liberty Loan bonds will sell above par as soon as the war is over.

No United States bondholder has ever lost a cent of principal or interest except those who voluntarily have taken losses by selling their bonds in a period of temporary price depression.

One hundred cents on the dollar, principal and interest, has the United States always paid its bondholders, and always will.

The coming Liberty Loan plans are being delayed by Congress, which is proceeding in a very leisurely way in a time of stress. If Congress would only do quickly whatever it is going to do, then the Treasury could also get on with its task.

The banks of the United States could float the coming Liberty Loan in a minute, but the result would wreck our financial system and prove a national calamity. The people must help in the task.

The millionaires of America might purchase from their available cash one billion dollars worth of Liberty Bonds, but nobody but the American people as a great body can float the coming Liberty Loan.

Back of the 250 billion dollars of our national resources stands the rugged honesty of America. Liberty Loan bonds are the safest security in the world.

It is for the people to lend their Government the amount of money it needs and take as security the best and soundest financial paper that has ever been issued by any government.

If the Government can take our boys, our products, our industries and our railroads, it can take our money; but never let it be said that it was necessary to conscript wealth to win the war.

All honor is due the splendid services of the many Liberty Loan workers in the state of Nebraska who are donating their services to the Government. They should receive the full co-operation of all the people in the performance of the task set before them.

The women of Nebraska will take an important part in the work of selling the third Liberty Loan bonds.

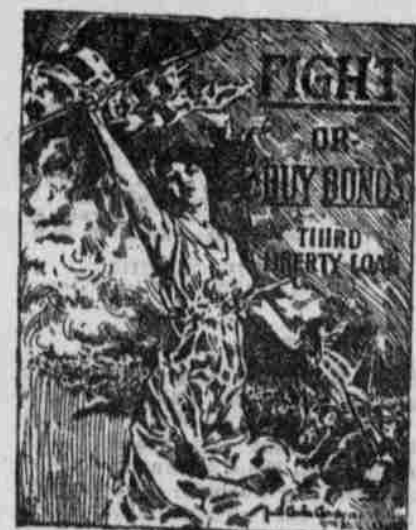

One of the strongest posters to be used in the third Liberty Loan campaign is entitled "Halt the Hun." It was drawn by Henry Raleigh. Five hundred thousand of these posters, in six colors, have been prepared for distribution. The composition and colorings are very striking, all of the figures being in black crayon set against a buff background, which is streaked with flames of lurid red. The powerful appeal "Halt the Hun!" stands forth in strong red lettering.

A modernized spirit of victory bearing an American flag and towering determinedly above advancing columns of American troops is the dominant figure of a poster design contributed by Howard Chandler Christy for use in the third Liberty Loan campaign. Art critics declare that Christy has risen to new heights in endowing this painting with the spirit of freedom and victory.

Meat Animals Increase.
Reports based on figures from the Department of Agriculture show that January 1, 1918, the number of meat animals in the United States was greater by more than 6,000,000 head than it was January 1, 1917. The number of inspections for slaughter indicated a decrease in consumption.
The summary shows the total number of cattle in the United States January 1, 1918, was 66,830,000, an increase of 1,247,000 head over the same day the year before. Hogs increased 3,781,000 head, or 5.7 per cent. The increase in sheep was 1,284,000 head, or 2.7 per cent.
