### DRAFTED MEN TO TRAIN AT THE UNIVERSITY.

Negotiations for the use of the University of Nebraska as a vocational training school for soldiers in the national army, which have been pending for several weeks were consummated at 5 p. m. Wednesday when the contracts were signed by Captain Andrew L. Knight, representative of the war department, and university authorities. The contract was signed in the presence of the executive committee of the board of regents.

The men will be detailed to Lincoln for training May 15. They should arrive here on that date, and after a few days of preliminary preparation will start the courses of training in the university laboratories. Seven courses will be offered. Six of them will be two-month courses, while the seventh auto mechanics, will last for only one month. The contract called for the use of the university building for a period of four months, which means that two groups of men in the six courses, and four detachments of tractor men will be trained.

The courses that will be offered, together with the number of men in each is as follows:

Automobile mechanics	250
Forge work	25
Machine shop work	50
Radio telegraphy	200
Tractor mechanics	90
Libelwrights	20
Wood shop work	40
Total	675

At least 300 of the men will take a part of their work at the state farm. The men who take work in automobile mechanics, tractor mechanics and wheelwrights will do most of their classwork at the farm. The others will remain altogether on the town campus. A plan is also under consideration of the use of the Nebraska military academy as a school of radio telegraph, but the plan for its establishment was not included in the contract. That would increase the number of men that could be handled in Lincoln, but it is thought that would not materially affect the work of the state university.—Lincoln Journal.
