OVER TWO MILLION MEN
 ARE NOW IN SERVICE.

There was made on the floor of congress Wednesday afternoon the prediction that the United States would have between four and five million men on the fighting lines in France before July 1, 1918. This statement was made by Chas. Caldwell, of New York, a member of the military affairs committee. He based his information on data furnished by the war department and is in close relationship with that branch of the government.

The data given was taken from official summaries of the situation and based upon what has already been accomplished, given by the war department and said to be authentic. These figures showed that within one year after the United States entered the world war one million men were stationed in France and taking up to the cause of their allies. During the first ten days of May there were transported successfully to friendly European shores ninety thousand men he stated.

The official figures, supplied by the war department, showed that by June first of this year there would be stationed in France 1,889,894 men and in addition 148,388 American officers. These men, all trained in the service would represent an army of over two million men, the exact figure being 2,038,222. This figure far exceeds any previous estimates of number overseas which have been made or even forecasted.

Registration of Children.

Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of next week are the days for the registration of all children in North Platte under the age of five. This is done at the request of the United States Government and is part of its Child Welfare program which seeks to prevent deaths of children. The Government furnishes the card for the registration and the essential facts it is desirous of obtaining in regard to each child are its age, its weight and its height. The weight and height of a child have proven to be very good tests of its normal development. On the portion of the registration card which is to be retained by the mother is given a table showing what a child's height and weight should be at certain ages.

On Monday, May 27th from two to five in the afternoon a meeting will be held at the Washington school for the purpose of distributing cards and furnishing any information concerning them that may be desired. A similar meeting will be held at the Lincoln school on Tuesday afternoon and on Wednesday afternoon at the Jefferson school. The committee in charge of the registration at North Platte had hoped to have the cards distributed to every family but owing to lack of time and means has not been able to do it but it is hoped that every mother of a child in North Platte that is under five will be sufficiently interested and patriotic enough to go to the meeting which is most convenient for her and get a card, fill it out and return it to the County Chairman, Mrs. M. E. Crosby.

GERMANS ARE SLOW AND ARE LOSING FIGHTING SPIRIT.
 Striking viciously at the enemy at various points along the western battle front; meeting each outburst of German artillery with a thunder of cannon fire, and maintaining the mastery of the air in every sector from the North sea to the Swiss frontier, the armies of the entente allies are preventing the Teutonic armies from quietly perfecting their preparations for coming battles. With the knowledge that the passing of each day brings new American legions to help crush the next German offensive, the allies are finding satisfaction in the fact that the Germans have as yet been unable to launch a new blow in the struggle which Berlin had expected to be the decisive one of the war.
 For the most part the Germans have shown but little of their habitual fighting spirit along the line in France. They have been thrust back in four sectors and the allies have succeeded in winning ground which will be of great importance in the future. But the Germans have counter attacked in only one instance and this movement was carried out so slowly and with such lack of dash that it was easily broken up before the Teutons had reached the new allied positions.
