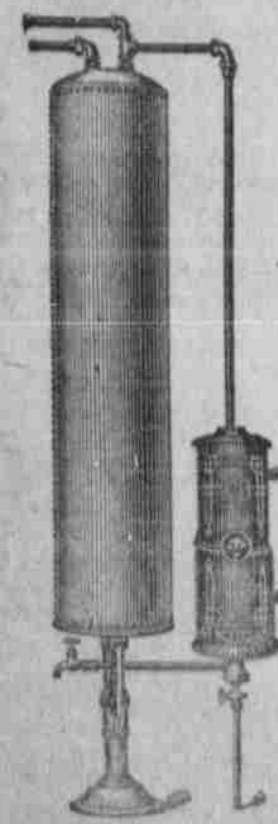

### NORTH PLATTE MORE THAN DOUBLES ITS QUOTA.

If all sections of the United States subscribe as liberally to the Red Cross war fund as did North Platte, the total will reach over two hundred millions for let it be known that this city has subscribed \$1,992.50 or more than double its quota of \$5,500. In addition to this the North Platte school district outside of the city subscribed \$295.50 making a grand total of \$12,299 for the district. The quota for the district was \$5,500, so that the district gave \$1,299 more than double its quota.

### RICHARD OWENS FOUND DEAD YESTERDAY MORNING.

Richard Owens, for many years employed as a hollermaker by the Union Pacific and for thirty or more years a North Platte resident, was found dead in a building on his premises in the Fourth ward yesterday. Mr. Owens worked at night at the round house and usually Mrs. Owens arises at five o'clock in the morning and unlocks the door so that her husband may enter and then goes back to bed. Yesterday morning she unlocked the door, and again retiring fell asleep. Awakening an hour or so later, she found Mr. Owens lunch bucket on a table and supposing her husband was in the back yard went out. Not finding him in sight and discovering a door to one of the buildings partly opened, she attempted to push the door back and was horrified to find the limp body of her husband lying against it. She spoke to him, but receiving no response, summoned neighbors and a physician, but when the latter arrived he pronounced that life had been extinct some time.

A number of months ago Mr. Owens had severe kidney trouble which affected his heart and for a time it was thought he could not live. He recovered, however, and had apparently been in excellent health. His death was due, doubt, to a sudden return of the heart trouble.

The deceased leaves a wife, three children—Will of this city, Elmer at Alliance and Maude, who lives in Arizona. His aged mother, who makes her home with a daughter in Hershey also survives.

Arrangements for the funeral have not at this writing been made.

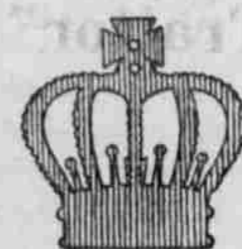
