GERMANY MUST WIN SOON
OR HER CAUSE IS LOST.

The Prussian war lords have promised the German people a victorious end of the war by next fall, according to official information which the American government deems reliable.

Hindenburg knows that if Germany cannot win this summer she cannot win at all, and he is prepared to sacrifice human life as never before in a last desperate effort to win a final military decision in favor of the central powers.

The steady stream of American fighters pouring into France has heartened the allies beyond measure, and there no longer is any doubt that the four great nations, bearing the brunt of battle will remain steadfast to the victorious end.

BOMBING BY AIR MEN
DELAY GERMAN PLANS.

No signs are observed according to correspondents at the front, of the enemy's intentions as to the time and place of the delivery of his expected strokes.

Bombing operations have been so extensive that tons of explosives have been unloaded on military objectives many more than 1,000 tons to date.

FAVOR AUTO OWNERS
PAYING SPECIAL TAX.

A special tax on every automobile in Nebraska for the maintenance of a system of good roads throughout the state is the proposal contained in a resolution adopted by the Nebraska Association of Commercial Clubs at its meeting in Alliance.

The idea is to put the cost of maintaining good roads on the people who use them, instead of on those whose property adjoins the highways.

Secretary of State Pool has already issued 150,000 automobile licenses for 1918 in Nebraska.
