A special tax on every automobile in Nebraska for the maintenance of s system of good roads throughout the state is the proposal contained in a resolution adopted by the Nebraska Association of Commercial Clubs at its meeting in Alliance.

Besides this, it s estimated by engineers that the life of a car would be prolonged 20 per cent and repairs reduced to a minimum if the roads of the state were kept in perfect condition. And in view of this, the proposed tax would be a mere bagatelle, a fine investment for every




