Would Improve Highway.  
C. M. Trotter, John Davis and E. N. Ogier, who went to Kearney Tuesday to attend the meeting called for the purpose of discussing the Lincoln Highway, report a large attendance of men from points along the Highway. Due to probably better kept roads, the O. L. D. route which runs through the south part of the state from Lincoln to Denver, has been touted very strongly at Omaha and as a result the Lincoln Highway has been losing out on much auto tourist travel that should come this way. The Kearney meeting was for the purpose of devising means for a betterment of road conditions in each of the counties through which the Highway passes. It developed that the worst section of the Highway is east of Grand Island and efforts will be made to have the roads in that section improved. A committee was appointed to devise ways and means of employing a competent road inspector who will look the Highway over clear across the state.

The opinion of the delegates was that if the Lincoln Highway hopes to maintain its supremacy as the great overland route through Nebraska, greater attention must be paid to the condition of the roads.  
With the exception of about five miles between Brady and the east county line, the Highway in Lincoln county is in very fair shape at the present time.

A Patriotic Boy.  
Last Tuesday while driving over from Dickens, Charlie Liston overtook walking in the road a young man, about nineteen. Charlie stopped, asked the boy where he was bound for, and replying North Platte, he was invited to ride. It developed that his name was Dunton, that he was walking the forty miles from Somerset to North Platte that he might enlist in the marines. "I bought a liberty bond and subscribed to the Red Cross, but I feel that is not doing enough for Uncle Sam, so I want to join the marines," said young Dunton. ## NEWS ABOUT THE BOYS WHO ARE IN SERVICE.

Friends of Sergeant Paul Thomson, formerly of the Experimental station, have received word that he has arrived safely in France.

Will A. Robinson, who enlisted in the navy about a year ago and was assigned to the battleship Oklahoma, left for Iowa last night after visiting his brothers in this city for several days.

Lester R. Wood, now at Camp Funston as a member of the hospital corps, arrived home on a short furlough Wednesday night. He is the only North Platte man left at Camp Funston. He says 35,000 men are expected to arrive at that camp next week.

Warren Doolittle, who was sent to Camp Funston and from there to Baltimore, has been transferred to Niagara Falls, N. Y., as an experimenting chemist in manufacture of shells, bombs and gases. He was one of six selected from a class of 200 for this work.

Word was received in town yesterday that Ben Johnson and Wm. Seibold have safely arrived overseas. They were sent from this city to Camp Funston and became part of the 355th Infantry. A short time ago they were assigned to an eastern training camp and are now about ready to go on the firing line.

In a letter to his father, Lee Bird, a student at the school of aeronautics at Urbana, Ill., writes that he passed his examinations Saturday and was given better than eighty per cent on all grades. Sixty per cent was necessary to pass. Lee has now completed the ground work and is ready for the flyers' school. He expects to be sent to some aviation field in a few days.

Mrs. Wilcox Passes Away.  
Mrs. Cynthia Wilcox, mother of J. Q. Wilcox, died at the home of her grandson Roy F. Cottorell yesterday morning at the age of seventy-nine. Last Monday evening Mr. and Mrs. Cottorell had been out watering the garden and upon entering the house found Mrs. Wilcox in the bath room in a semi-conscious condition, apparently having suffered a partial apoplectic stroke. She was placed in bed and a physician summoned. Though she regained consciousness, she continued to fail, and the end came at five o'clock yesterday morning.

For a number of years Mrs. Wilcox had made her home with her children and with Mr. and Mrs. Cottorell. Surviving children are: J. Q. Wilcox of this city, D. P. Wilcox of Cozad, Mrs. Flora Kitzmiller of Oakland, Cal., and Mrs. F. J. Cottorell of Lead City, S. D.

Funeral services will be held at the Cottorell residence, 615 South Pine, at three o'clock this afternoon. The body will be taken to Aurora for interment.
