RED CROSS PLANS BIG DOINGS DURING THE FAIR.

Through the courtesy and with the assistance of the county fair association, the Red Cross will conduct evening programs at the fair grounds during the continuance of the fair, September 25th, 26th, 27th and 28th. Tentative arrangements have been made for running, pacing and trotting races at night by the horses that will be entered in the regular fair races, this being made possible by arc lights being strung around the track. In addition to the horse races, several free attractions which have been engaged by the fair association will also give evening exhibitions. Over an Inch of Rain Falls.

Ninety-four one hundredths of an inch of rain fell Monday night, Tuesday forenoon and Tuesday night, thus relieving the farmers who were beginning to fear corn and potatoes would be injured by dry weather. The rain, from reports received, was general over the county. Very heavy rain fell along North River branch road Monday night, a small section of the road-bed being washed out near Sarben.

Glenn Ritter Promoted.

The value of military drill and a high school education to the young man who enlists in the service is demonstrated in the case of Glenn Ritter. Last year in school Glenn was major of the high school cadets, taking great interest in the work, and was also a member of the 1918 graduating class. Last month he went to Grand Island, enlisted in the navy and was sent to the Great Lakes training school. He had been there but a few weeks when after a day of hard drilling he was summoned to the office of the commandant and interrogated as to his age, residence, education and military experience and then excused. An hour later he was again summoned and told that he had been promoted to section chief, which corresponds with a second lieutenant in the infantry. As section chief Glenn will be in charge of sixty men.
