Minister Draws \$50 Fine.

Elect Delegates to Encampment.

At a meeting of the local camp of Spanish War Veterans Tuesday evening C. W. Likes and A. W. Brown, were elected delegates from the camp to the national encampment to be held at Baltimore September 3d, 4th and 5th. In addition to these A. W. Shilling, Department Commander of Nebraska, is a delegate by reason of his official position, and W. D. Estelman, Julius Hoga, D. E. Moody and A. E. Bell have been selected as delegates at large from the state. A majority of the delegates named above are making arrangements to go to Baltimore.

Award Contracts for Uniforms.

The contract for furnishing uniforms for the Home Guards was awarded Wednesday night to Ed Burke. The price is \$12.50 each laid down in North Platte.

At present there is only sufficient money in the treasury to purchase about eighty uniforms, about thirty of which will be needed for the drum corps, leaving but fifty for the Guards. It is therefore necessary that additional funds be raised to provide at least fifty more. Just how this money is to be garnered will be decided upon by the committee at an early date.

Will Use Sugar Cards.

Beginning this month the local grocers will use sugar cards, showing the amount each purchaser buys from one or more merchants. The stubs of the card is returned to the food administrator and by this means he is enabled to keep tab on the amount each household purchases, whether he buys from one or more grocers. This serves as a check on the man who might act unfair and secure more sugar than he is entitled.

Reduce Voluntary Induction.

No more of the 1917-18 classes or national army men are to be inducted into the marines or any branches of the navy, according to a late ruling of the provost marshal received here. All voluntary inductions of these men into any branch of the service have also been reduced in number, because of the diminishing number of men listed in the first class. Four thousand four hundred Nebraskans will be called to the colors during the month of August, and this will exhaust the first class in many counties. To avoid this voluntary induction is being curtailed.

Penalize Herred Grocery.

The Food Administration has decreed that the Herred grocery shall sell no sugar for a stated period, probably thirty days. This penalty has been assessed by reason of a violation of the state administration's rules relating to the handling of sugar. The administrator issues his rules with the expectation that they be observed without equivocation and the party who in any way violates the order is penalized.

Takes Over Local Exchange.

The North Platte telephone exchange, along with all other property of the Nebraska Telephone Co., was turned over to the United States government at midnight Wednesday.

Manager Pratt took a complete inventory of the company's property in North Platte, paid all bills, and started the government out with a clean slate. Manager Pratt and eighteen or twenty girls employed in the exchange as well as the line men, are now working for Uncle Sam, so they had better "be good."

Hail Storm Destroys Crops.

D. E. Martin, who lives north of Hershey, was in town Wednesday and reported that a hailstorm Tuesday evening had cut into shreds over 300 acres of his corn. Will Bell and several other farmers in that section are said to have suffered a total destruction of crops. The hail was so severe that it beat the grain out of the shocked sheaves of wheat. Hail stones as large as hen's eggs are reported to have fallen, but scarcely a drop of rain fell. The area covered by the storm was large and the destruction of crops in the district is said to have been almost total.

Soldiers in France Need Books.

The North Platte Public Library has received today a request from the American Library Association's headquarters in Washington for more books from this community for the men overseas.

The appeal from Washington states that new novels and good Western stories, whether new or old, are most needed. Books by Zane Grey, Rex Beach, Jack London, Ralph Connor, Owen Wister and O. Henry are very popular. The Public Library announces that it will receive and forward all suitable books that are turned in. It urges the friends of the soldiers and sailors, many of whom have already responded most generously, to give more books.

Yankees Advance Two Miles.

Plunging northward from Sergy, American troops have made a brilliant and important advance in desperate fighting and apparently have opened the way for further successful operations in the Marne salient.

The stoutest resistance was no obstacle for the Americans and they now are on the Pere-en-Tardenois-Coulon ge. highway south of the forest of Nesles. The advance late Tuesday measured a little less than two miles. French troops on the wings moved forward also and allied pressure on the banks of the pocket is being maintained.

In their advance the Americans drove a wedge into the enemy line and the allies now are in a position to drive the Germans back by flank movements both east and west of the head of the apex which lies near Nesles.

Ex-Czar Collapses.

Amsterdam, July 31.—Given two hours in which to prepare for the end, Nicholas Romanoff, former Russian emperor, was taken out by his executioners in a state of such collapse that it was necessary to prop him against a post, says the Lokal Anzeiger of Berlin, which claims to have received from a high Russian personage an account of the emperor's last hours.

As he was unable to stand without support, when the place of execution was reached he was propped against a post. He raised his hands and seemed to be trying to speak, but the rifles spoke and he fell dead.
