WILLIAM WEEKS DROWNS AT THE SOUTH RIVER BRIDGE.

The deep swimming hole at the new bridge at the South Platte River claimed another boy Friday evening about 7:30. The unfortunate boy this time was William, the eleven year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Weeks. William accompanied two of the Dickey boys to the river, but not being able to swim contented himself for a time in wading in the shallow water. In doing this he ventured too near the edge of the deep hole, the sides of which are almost perpendicular with from eight to ten feet of water therein. He cried to his companions as he sank, but they were powerless to give him aid, and by the time the attention of the workers on the bridge were attracted he had gone down to his death. The body had been in the water about forty-five minutes before recovered.

The funeral was held Sunday afternoon from the Episcopal church, Rev. Arthur Jones conducting the services which were largely attended by friends of the family.

To the grief-stricken parents the sympathy of all our people goes out in the loss of their son.

NEWS ABOUT THE BOYS WHO ARE IN SERVICE.

Word received yesterday announced that Lieut. Burton W. Lambert, of this city, had arrived overseas.

Lieut. Percy Schatt, of Camp Cody one of Company E's original officers, spent yesterday in town while enroute to Cody from Camp Perry where he had been receiving rifle instructions.

Walter Ellis, who was sent from here to Camp Dodge, has been transferred to the officers' training camp at Louisville, Ky., and will go in training for a second lieutenant. Walter's friends will be glad to learn of his success.

A letter from Earle Hubbard, with the A. E. F. in active service in France, states that he is feeling well, eats three meals a day, and is alright as yet. He says that all North Platte friends "Hello, would be glad to receive letters from them."

A letter received by the home folks from Fred Dick, of Co. E, 31st Engineers stationed at Saumur, France, (the censor allowing the name to appear) states that he is feeling fine as is also Biggs, Thayer and the other North Platte boys. The letter is dated June 30th and the Americans were making arrangements for a big celebration on July 4th.

Sergeant Scully Trent, Corporal Paul Marti and Corporal Fay Brewer, members of Company E at Camp Cody, arrived home Sunday on a ten day furlough. Sergeant Scully was the first man to sign the muster roll when Company E was organized, Corporal Marti, the youngest as well as the smallest man in the company has "filled out" wonderfully since going to Camp Cody and now looks like a real soldier.

Earle Wright, who is stationed with Co. L, 15th Infantry at Teintsin, China, writes that the month of May was spent on the rifle range at target practice. The month of June was spent on the seacoast where swimming was a part of their training. He says he is feeling fine and likes the work but will not be satisfied if he does not go to France. He visited the Great Wall of China and says it is a wonderful piece of workmanship.

Captain P. R. Halligan arrived from Camp Cody Saturday night and will spend this week in town visiting his parents and friends. Captain Halligan's company is not now quite up to war strength, having 195 men, but the number lacking will soon be furnished. He feels quite confident that Company E will be ordered out of Cody between September 1 and October 1. Only sixty-five men who were with Company E when it left here are now members of the organization and nearly all of them are now sergeants or corporals.

A North Platte boy in France clips the following from the Stars and Stripes, the paper published by the American soldiers and sends it home: second class mail is no more certain of arriving in the S. O. S. than it is anywhere else. So one man who likes, much as do the rest of us, to see the home town paper once in a while, has his wife send out the news that will interest him and ship it along in a sealed envelope, postage paid. When he gets a letter from home his office looks like a clipping bureau. But he finds out what's going on.

Sizzling Weather.

Weather Regulator Shilling has started out the month of August with a temperature that sure makes one perspire freely and when remonstrated with yesterday, smiling said "Why don't you go to Omaha where they have real summer weather, and where the temperature Sunday climbed up to 110, the hottest ever known in that city." But thanks, it's hot enough here. Last Thursday the temperature was ninety-seven, Friday ninety-two, Saturday 102, Sunday ninety-eight and yesterday it was 95.

Allies Hold Most of Salient.

Four-fifths of the salient between Selons and Rheims which was occupied by the Germans on the morning of July 18 is now in allied hands, and the end is not yet. While American advance of more than six miles in the last twenty-four hours has been comparatively easy going, the success is the result of the last week's heavy fighting.

Allies Take Many Prisoners.

The German retreat continues unabated, with the allies in hot pursuit. Apparently the situation now has resolved itself into a race for the northern bank of the Aisne river by the Germans, who have been evicted from the strategic positions along the Vesle river, in the center of the line and directly east of Rheims, which seemingly renders necessary that they put the Aisne between themselves and their pursuers to escape further large losses of men made prisoner. Just how large this bag of captives is at present cannot be reckoned, but unofficial advices from Paris assert that when the figures are made public they will thrill the allied world. General Ferghing in his communication says the Americans alone have taken 8,400 prisoners and in addition 133 guns.
