On Friday evening, August 9, there will be a box supper given at the Yeoman Hall for the benefit of the Sutherland Home Guards. The Home Guards will be at a big expense in procuring suits and other things necessary to put them on an equal footing with the other guards in the state.

(Maxwell Telegraph.) Five men from Maxwell went out to H. P. Stevens' yesterday and shocked forty acres of barley for him. Gosh! The grain goes into the shock quicker and at less expense for labor than in ordinary times because these fresh hands hustle.

Eight more patriotic men went to Peter Kling's place Friday and shocked about 100 acres of wheat for him. Kling was only too glad the Maxwell men gave him a lift. He has between two and three hundred acres of good wheat.

Monday afternoon Ira Fisher, north of town, when out hunting came near having his arm torn off by a discharge from his shot gun. In some manner the gun which was pointed upward, discharged a load of shot into the arm near the shoulder, tore the flesh from the bone, inflicting a ghastly wound.

It will be of interest to people of this county and community to learn that the Maxwell State Bank, recently taken, in charge by Leslie R. Prior, of Kearney, has as associates Messrs. Fielsticker and Scott, president and cashier, respectively, of the Platte Valley State Bank of North Platte. This change in the management and associations, together with increasing the capital stock from \$10,000 to \$25,000, will add much to the strength of the bank financially, as well as give it prestige not heretofore enjoyed. We are informed that Roy Cochran who is an officer of the field artillery in France, is now one of the instructors with the big guns and that he is now far behind the lines and is giving instructions to the new recruits that are arriving daily.

A. S. Allen, Lincoln county's affable clerk, was a Brady visitor last Saturday forenoon. Mr. Allen is out for the re-nomination of county clerk on the Republican ticket, and was here shaking hands with old friends and new voters. Mr. Allen, besides all his extra work for the government, has proved himself a popular county official, and should be returned to the office for the period of the war.

Next year the big bridge across the Platte river at Brady is to be built, and we believe it is no more than right that County Commissioner E. J. Springer, the man who fostered this proposed improvement should be elected for another term. While the bridge seems assured, it is not built yet and a new man elected from another neighborhood could not be expected to take much interest in our improvements. The ceremony was performed at 4 o'clock and came as a complete surprise as the young people in company with Miss Gladys Marr and Mr. Shirley Everhart had gone to Cheyenne to take in the Frontier celebration, and had not mentioned their intentions to anyone. Both are numbered among Hershey's younger social set and their friends extend hearty congratulations.

It is estimated that at last ninetenths of the crop on the Birdwood table were destroyed Tuesday night by hail. The storm was not accompanied by much wind, but the hail ranged in size from about three quarters of an inch in diameter to great slugs of jagged ice. The corn is a pitiful sight—where great ears were struck by these large hail stones they were completely broken off, and grain in the shock was pounded considerably.

Wm. Boyle had better than 400 acres of corn and about 105 acres of uncut wheat. Wm. Bell had 235 acres of corn and he estimates he lost close to 10,000 bushels, Robert Houtson, Thos.

Hawley, Chris Jensen and numerous others were also very heavy losers. The storm was between two and three miles wide and when it reached the valley the hail stones were not quite so large but they stripped the corn badly and corn is practically a loss. Beats were cut up and the small grain in shocks was pounded unmercifully.

It seems there were two storms as another storm broke in south of town and almost cleaned out C. A. Johnson and C. J. Hildebrand, who only a short time ago were touched up with hail.

By virtue of the authority vested in me by law, and in accordance with Section 2159 of the Revised Statutes of Nebraska for 1913, I, A. S. Allen, County Clerk of the County of Lincoln, State of Nebraska, do hereby direct and proclaim that a Primary Election be held in the several polling places throughout the County of Lincoln, State of Nebraska, on Tuesday, the 20th day of August, 1918, during the hours designated by law for the following purposes, to-wit: For the nomination of: One candidate by each of the political parties for United States Senator. One candidate for Congress by each of the political parties for the Sixth Congressional District. Candidates by each of the political parties for the following offices: One Governor. One Lieutenant Governor. One Secretary of State. One Auditor of Public Accounts. One State Treasurer. One Attorney General. One Commissioner of Public Lands and Buildings. One Railway Commissioner. One State Senator for the Twenty-fifth Senatorial District. One State Representative for the 68th District. One State Representative for the 77th District.

Also the non-partisan nomination of six Judges of the Supreme Court. The non-partisan nomination for four Regents of the State University. The non-partisan nomination for two candidates for State Superintendent of Public Instruction. At the same time and places will be submitted the question of the calling of a constitutional convention. Also Candidate by each of the political parties for the office of: One County Clerk. One County Treasurer. One Sheriff. One County Surveyor. One County Attorney. One County Commissioner, 2nd District. Also the non-partisan nominations of two candidates for County Judge. Also the non-partisan nomination of two candidates for County Superintendent of Public Instruction. Also one candidate by each of the political parties for the office of: Police Magistrate for the City of North Platte.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 5th, A. D. 1918:

A JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Section one (1) of Article seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska. Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska: Section 1. That Section One of Article Seven of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be and the same hereby is amended by striking out the following words: "Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have declared their intention to become citizens conformably to the laws of the United States, on the subject of naturalization, at least thirty days prior to an election."

And inserting in the place of the words so stricken, the following words: "Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have become citizens of the United States by naturalization or otherwise conformably to the laws of the United States at least thirty days prior to an election." Sec. 2. That at the general election nineteen hundred and eighteen (1918) there shall be submitted to the electors of the state for their approval or rejection the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage. At such election, on the ballot of each elector voting for or against said proposed amendment, shall be written or printed the words: "For proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage." and "Against said proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage." Sec. 3. If such amendment shall be approved by a majority of all electors voting at such election, said amendment shall constitute Section One (1) Article Seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska. Approved, April 9, 1918.
