HARRY BAILOR WRITES OF SOLDIER LIFE IN FRANCE.

Harry Bailor, of this city, who has been with Co. F, 13th Engineers, for about a year, writes the following letter to his father under date of June 27th:

I returned from my ten day permission the tenth of this month and to show you that a soldier's life in France is not all that Sherman said war was, we'll give you an outline of the places I visited.

My first stop was Lyon, the second city of France. Was there twenty-four hours. It is a beautiful city. Next in size to Paris, but a much cleaner city, with no signs of war or bombardments either from long range artillery or aviators, and the class of people I met was so much better than any I had ever met that I wondered if I was really in France...

My next place, only a three hour trip from Lyon, was "Aix Les Bains," the most famous summer resort in France and the U. S. government's designated place for all American soldiers on leave. It is a wonderful place, surrounded by the most beautiful mountains I have ever seen and quite near a lake about the size of Salt Lake, Utah, and just as clear.

The government has provided first class hotel accommodations at different hotels throughout the city for the soldiers "free." The rooms are as comfortable as any one could possibly want. The meals are the best. I was surprised to learn at the expense the U. S. government had went to to provide for their soldiers after doing their bit for four or five months. They have left nothing undone to make a soldier's permission one of comfort and enjoyment. And then there is the Y. M. C. A. which has taken over the entire Casino, which is next to the one in Monte Carlo. It is a beautiful building, and the Y. M. C. A. workers are doing all in their power to make the boys feel at home and give each one a warm hearty hand shake that makes one feel welcome. For pastime they have several billiard tables, which cost not a cent. One can buy American cigarettes, cigars, pipes, tobacco, in fact every thing a smoker wants. They have gum, candy, hot and cold soft drinks, cookies and cakes, all at very little cost. Then they have a large reading and writing room. At night, concerts and movies twice a week, first class vaudeville, and twice a week they have a picnic trip across the lake and two trips each week up in the mountains. So you see it is a trip well worth taking. We are allowed seven days there, and after being at the front for over nine months it was hard to leave, but it does wonders for a man. A week of good "vats" and "sleeps" braces men up. I understand each one is to get ten days every four months. I sincerely hope so as four months "up here" is plenty without a rest.

Next month we get our second service stripe, one every six months. In some ways it has been a long year and short in others. However, I'm glad I'm an American. Its great to be a "Yank" and I'm glad I volunteered to do my bit for the best country in the world. I wish to thank The Tribune for sending me the paper regularly. After reading it I pass it along to Sergt. Robinson of E Company and I assure you it was encouraging to see how North Platte went "over the top" for the Third Liberty Loan. It takes lots of money to hold us up here, so please don't be "stingy."

"The Thing We Love," the latest Paramount Picture, starring Wallace Reid, contains one of the strongest patriotic appeals ever filmed. It is to be shown at the Keith theatre Saturday. From an idealistic, impractical point, through gradual stages we watch the progression of the hero to a self-sacrificing, high-hearted volunteer. The mental stages that he passed through will be recognized by many a loyal American as exactly the fight they fought, the battles they had with themselves until they came to the full realization of "The Thing We Love."

Ordinance No. 96.

BEING THE GENERAL LEVY OF TAXES ON THE PROPERTY OF THE CITY OF NORTH PLATTE, NEBRASKA, FOR REVENUE PURPOSES, DURING THE FISCAL YEAR COMMENCING THE SECOND MONDAY IN AUGUST, 1918.

BE it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the city of North Platte, Nebraska:

Section I. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the city of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska, at the rate of 6 mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the purpose of paying interest and principal on the One Hundred Thousand Dollar Water Bonds issued by said city.

Section II. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of 2 mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation for the purpose of paying the interest and principal on the Twenty-five Thousand Dollar Sewer Bonds heretofore issued by said city.

Section III. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of 3-4 mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the purpose of paying the interest on Twelve Thousand Dollar Bridge Bonds heretofore issued by said city.

Section IV. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of 1/2 mill on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the purpose of paying the interest on Ten Thousand Dollar Bridge Bonds heretofore issued by said city.

Section V. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of 1/2 mill on the dollar valuation thereof, for the purpose of paying interest on the Twelve Thousand Dollar Fire Station Bonds heretofore issued by said city.

Section VI. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the said city at the rate of 1/2 mill on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the purpose of paying the interest on the Twelve Thousand Dollar Park Bonds heretofore issued by said city.

Section VII. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the said city at the rate of 3-4 mill on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the purpose of paying the interest on the Sixteen Thousand Dollar Paving Bonds heretofore issued by said city.

Section VIII. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of 8 mills on the dollar of assessed valuation thereof, for general revenue purposes of said city for the fiscal beginning the second Monday of August 1918.

Section IX. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of 2 mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the public library fund to be expended in the maintenance of the free public library of said city for said fiscal year.

Section X. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of one and 1/2 mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation to be expended for the maintenance of public parks in said city for the said fiscal year.

Section XI. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of 4 1/2 mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the payment of the lighting of streets and alleys of said city for said fiscal year.

Section XII. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of 2 1/2 mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, to be expended in the maintenance and flushing of sewers.

Section XIII. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of 9 mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the fire department and the paying for fire protection for said fiscal year.

Section XIV. Taxes are hereby

levied on all of the property within the limits of said city at the rate of 2 1/2 mills on the dollar valuation thereof, for the cemetery fund, to be expended in the maintenance and upkeep of the cemetery for said fiscal year.

Section XV. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 5th, A. D. 1918:

A JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Section one (1) of Article seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska: Section 1. That Section One of Article Seven of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be and the same hereby is amended by striking out the following words:

"Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have declared their intention to become citizens conformably to the laws of the United States, on the subject of naturalization, at least thirty days prior to an election."

And inserting in the place of the words so stricken, the following words: "Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have become citizens of the United States by naturalization or otherwise conformably to the laws of the United States at least thirty days prior to an election."

Sec. 2. That at the general election nineteen hundred and eighteen (1918) there shall be submitted to the electors of the state for their approval or rejection the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage. At such election, on the ballot of each elector voting for or against said proposed amendment, shall be written or printed the words: "For proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage." and "Against said proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage."

Sec. 3. If such amendment shall be approved by a majority of all electors voting at such election, said amendment shall constitute Section One (1) Article Seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.
