PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of and Martin Magnuson, all of North Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of

the State of Nebraska to be voted upon at the general election to be County, Nebraska. held Tuesday, November 5th, A.D. 1918:

Section one (1) of Article seven (7) against the estate of the said John of the Constitution of the State of Bratt, deceased, that the 18th day of Nebraska.

the State of Nebraska:

Section 1. That Section One of Article Seven of the Constitution of the of all persons, against said estate and State of Nebraska be and the same that the county court of Lincoln hereby is amended by striking out the following words:

"Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have declared their intention to become citizens comformably to the laws of the United States, on the subject of naturalization, at least thirty days prior to an election."

And inserting in the place of the words so stricken, the following words:

"Second. Persons of foreign birth. who shall have become citizens of the United States by naturalization or otherwise conformably to the laws of forever barred. the United States at least thirty days prior to an election.

Sec. 2. That at the general election nineteen hundred and eighteen (1918) there shall be submitted to the electors of the state for their approval or rejection the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage. At such election, on the ballot of each elector voting for or against said proposed amendment, shall be written or printed the words: "For proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage," and "Against said proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of
