GERMAN RETREAT BLOCKED AS BRIDGES ARE DESTROYED.

All the bridges across the Somme between Peronne and Ham, a stretch of about 15 miles, have been destroyed by allied aviators. The Germans have been attempting to throw temporary bridges across the stream and the allied aviators are now systematically bombing these improvised structures.

The long range cannon with which the Germans have intermittently bombarded Paris for more than four months have now been silent for two days. This fact may be explained by the allied advance toward Noyon and Guiscard, six and one-half miles north of Noyon, whence the recent firing is said to have been proceeding, as these localities are now endangered by the French forward push.

The number of prisoners taken so far in the allied offensive in Picardy is now estimated at 36,000, including more than 1,000 officers. More than 500 guns have been captured, according to the latest advices.

CONDITION OF GERMAN ARMY DEEMED TO BE PERILOUS.

The French have driven the Germans before them for an important gain east of Montdidier in Picardy. That city, which was the apex of a German salient that now has been wiped out, fell to the French first army at midday Saturday. Before nightfall, according to the French war office statement, the victorious French forces had carried the battle line forward to an average depth of six miles on a front of approximately twenty miles.

In the three days of engagements that culminated in the taking of Montdidier the French took 3,000 prisoners. Their captures also included 200 guns and an enormous amount of material.

South of Montdidier, the French have plunged thru the German lines on the hills west of the Matz river and are reported to be in the valley of the stream at Marquieles. When the situation is studied on a map it can be seen that the Germans are in a serious position east of Montdidier. The allies have closed in on Chaumes and have had the railroad junction south of that town under artillery fire for two days. If Chaumes is lost to the Germans they will be forced to make a long, perilous march eastward over country roads toward Noyon. The rapid progress of the French below Montdidier has placed even this road under fire and made it almost impossible as an avenue of escape.

Southern Negro Does His Bit.

John Ward, a negro of Goldsboro, North Carolina, has the record for individual effort in war service; having looked forward about forty years ago to war service. The following is his history:

John Ward, a negro of Goldsboro, has thirteen of his eighteen sons in the Ninth and Tenth United States cavalry, while his thirteen daughters are busy with war work. The facts are vouched for by Sheriff R. H. Edwards of Wayne county, of which Goldsboro is the county seat. Ward also holds the record for quadruplets, says Sheriff Edwards, who gives the record thus: Ward was born April 21, 1856, at Goldsboro. He was married three times and his last wife is now living. His first wife bore him fifteen children, four at one time twice, three at one time twice, one at one time once. His second wife bore him two at one time twice, three at one time once and five one at a time. His present wife has borne him eight, one at a time. His first wife lived six years and three weeks after marriage and his second wife eight years and six months.

Put Saving First.

From the Saturday Evening Post: Keep Hard up. Do not make your war appropriation at the end of the month out of what you have left. Make it at the first of the month, and live on what you have left. It is perfectly practicable and by no means as difficult as it may sound before you have tried it.

If your income should be reduced twenty per cent you would discover you could still live comfortably on it. Rise in commodity prices since America declared war is equivalent to a reduction of twenty per cent or more in income.

Four families out of five have partly or wholly offset it by cutting down consumption of various things and using cheaper articles in place of the dearer.

Three families out of five, attentively examining their out go, would be surprised to discover how much of it goes for looks, and how easily and comfortably their ideas of a proper appearance may be modified.

For example, one excellent housewife found it was necessary to iron her linen, underwear and small children's play dresses—the latter sure to be rumpled up half an hour after they were put on.

Four families out of five have discovered that extra demands upon income—the doctor's bill, the installment plan piano, and so on—are met with little hardship.

If you commit yourself to a definite war-saving appropriation, that will be met also. The plain fact is you would do it for a compelling reason—to save your house, or to save your job, or to keep from being sued, or if you were promised a hundred per cent on the money. The war reason ought to be as compelling as any.

Makes the appropriation and cinch the saving by putting it into war certificates or thrift stamps.

A much heavier trial than the country has yet met is coming this fall and winter. The country must do better than it has yet done or be ashamed.

Admits Submarine Failure.

Germany's unrestricted U-boat warfare could neither keep the army of the United States from taking part in the battles on the fields of France nor break the will of our allies to continue the war in the admission made by the Munich Post a copy of which has been received in London. In a review of the situation at the beginning of the fifth year of the war the Post says:

"Eighteen months of unrestricted warfare could not break the enemy's will to war nor prevent America's putting a well-equipped army of a million men on the western front. Hopes that after the conclusion of peace in the east the final struggle in the west would be decided in favor of Germany and bring a general peace, have proved deceptive, and the eastern peace itself is a disappointment."

The Post takes exception to the word "unfavorable" in describing the food situation in Germany and says "chronic famine" would be nearer the truth.

Chicago Boys Smash Huns.

The London papers describe the American operations that cleared up the awkward Clippily triangle as a remarkable feat. "The Americans were chiefly from Chicago," the papers say, "and so successfully did they do their job that they made more than 500 prisoners and opened the road to the further advance that has been made."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 5th, A. D. 1918:

A JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Section one (1) of Article seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska:

Section 1. That Section One of Article Seven of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be and the same hereby is amended by striking out the following words:

"Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have declared their intention to become citizens conformably to the laws of the United States, on the subject of naturalization, at least thirty days prior to an election."

And inserting in the place of the words so stricken, the following words:

"Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have become citizens of the United States by naturalization or otherwise conformably to the laws of the United States at least thirty days prior to an election."

Sec. 2. That at the general election nineteen hundred and eighteen (1918) there shall be submitted to the electors of the state for their approval or rejection the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage. At such election, on the ballot of each elector voting for or against said proposed amendment, shall be written or printed the words: "For proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage."

Sec. 3. If such amendment shall be approved by a majority of all electors voting at such election, said amendment shall constitute Section One (1) Article Seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.
