#### 177,000 NEBRASKANS WILL COME UNDER NEW DRAFT.

Nebraska has 177,000 men within the proposed new draft age limits of 18 to 45, it is estimated at Governor turing 1,600. Neville's office. The registration under get for September 5.

The war department is anticipating a September enrollment and has forwarded to Governor Naville 105 mail sacks containing printed blanks plies. The material will be sent out Wednesday north of the Ancre river to the "ocal boards.

The new registration, if the bill passs as planned, will call for boys from 18 to 20, inclusive, and men from 32 to 45, inclusive: Rough estimates place the coming registration at about one and one-half times as great as the first one, in 1917.



### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in held Tuesday, November 5th, A. D.

JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Section one (1) of Article seven (7) Nebraska.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska:

Section 1. That Section One of Article Seven of the Constitution of the torneys. State of Nebraska be and the same hereby is amended by striking out the following words:

"Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have declared their intention to become citizens comformably to the laws of the United States, on the subject of naturalization, at least thirty days prior to an election."

And inserting in the place of the words so stricken, the following words:

"Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have become citizens of the United States by naturalization or otherwise conformably to the laws of the United States at least thirty days prior to an election.

Sec. 2. That at the general election nineteen hundred and eighteen (1918) there shall be submitted to the electors of the state for their approval or rejection the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage. At such election, on the hallot of each elector voting for or against said proposed amendment, shall be written or printed "For proposed amendthe words: ment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage," and "Against said proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage.'

Sec. 3. If such amendment shall be approved by a majority of all electors voting at such election, said amendment shall constitute Section One (1) Article Seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska. Approved, April 9, 1918.
