I lived in North Platte 24 years and I love the dear old place very much and the many friends I used to have.

I see by the papers the work you are doing so well. I have given some holders to the Red Cross here and they are so well pleased with them that it made me think to send you some.

Serving a year and a half in the trenches and receiving four wounds from bursting shells, is the record of a young man now employed at the Liberty Inn. Going from Elkhart, Ind., to Canada he enlisted with the Canadian troops and served until wounded. He was discharged from hospital a nervous wreck from shell shock and invalided home. He is gradually recovering from his nervousness.

The several hundred artillery men who passed east on the troop train yesterday afternoon were about the liveliest lot of men that we have seen. They sang their songs in front of the canteen, and gave cheer after cheer for the Red Cross and the North Platte ladies.

Changes Union Pacific Train Service

Effective September 1st, the Union Pacific will inaugurate a new train to be designated as No. 7 leaving North Platte 4:00 P. M., carrying coaches Omaha to Ogden, Standard Sleeper to Portland, and Tourist Sleeper to Los Angeles, with Dining Car serving all meals. Corresponding train No. 8 east bound leaving North Platte 2:00 P. M.

No. 7 will carry the coaches formerly carried by No. 9 and No. 9 hereafter, will be a mail train exclusively without passenger accommodations.
