STUDENTS' ARMY TRAINING CORPS TO MOBILIZE OCT. 1.

Washington, Sept. 1.—Members of the students' army training corps, consisting of youths between the ages of 18 and 21, will be mobilized October 1 at more than 300 colleges...

The members of the students' army training corps will be "soldiers on active duty," a statement issued by the War department says. Upon their induction into service their subsistence quarters, clothing and tuition will be provided by the government...

High school graduates will be eligible to the collegiate training division of the corps and grammar school graduates may enter the vocational section. As the students show ability they will be transferred to new duties and those showing special qualifications will be sent to officers' training schools.

The War department in its statement advises youths now ready for college entrance or already enrolled in a college to adhere to their plans and obtain voluntary induction into the corps.

The war department's plan of virtually taking over the colleges of the country as an emergency war education measure presents an opportunity to the poor boy to get at least a part of the freshman year at college at government expense.

The boy entering college this fall will proceed as in peace times. He will pay his own traveling expenses and at the outset pay his tuition and board. About October 1, while at school, he will be inducted into the training corps.

Proposed Constitutional Amendment. The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 5th, A. D. 1918:

A JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Section one (1) of Article seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska: Section 1. That Section One of Article Seven of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be and the same hereby is amended by striking out the following words:

"Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have declared their intention to become citizens conformably to the laws of the United States, on the subject of naturalization, at least thirty days prior to an election."

And inserting in the place of the words so stricken, the following words: "Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have become citizens of the United States by naturalization or otherwise conformably to the laws of the United States at least thirty days prior to an election."

Sec. 2. That at the general election nineteen hundred and eighteen (1918) there shall be submitted to the electors of the state for their approval or rejection the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage. At such election, on the ballot of each elector voting for or against said proposed amendment, shall be written or printed the words: "For proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage." and "Against said proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage."

Sec. 3. If such amendment shall be approved by a majority of all electors voting at such election, said amendment shall constitute Section One (1) Article Seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.
