



More Wheat Flour.

After months of purchasing on a basis of one pound of wheat flour to one pound of substitutes, Nebraska housewives are able to buy on the new basis, one pound of substitutes for each four pounds of wheat flour Or, instead, they may buy the regulation mixed flours if they desire and thereby relieve themselves of buying substitutes.

Under the new ruling, all breakfast foods are eliminated and flours put in their place.

Bakers' bread will wso contain more wheat if bakers se desire, for only 20 per cent substitutes are required.
