

-::0::-Influenza is Spreading.

Spanish influenza continues to spread in army camps. More than 14,000 new cases were reported to the office of the surgeon general during the twenty-four hours ending at noon Wednesday. This was an increase of 3,600 cases over the preceding day. Pneumonia cases also increased with 1.003 and 300 deaths.

The total number of influenza cases in all camps now is 88,000 while proteomonia cases number 6,769. Deaths since the epidemic began number 1,877.

Camp Custer, Mich., where influenza had not previously appeared, re-ported 1,764 cases. The most serious increase was at Camp Meade, Mary-land, which reported 1,327 cases against 396 the day before

Camp Pike, Ark., again reported more than 1.000 cases, while Camp Hancock, Ga., reported 716 cases against two the day before. At Camp Funston, Kan., the number of cases increased from 141 to 756. Camp Devons. Mass., was the only one which did not report an increase

Every available medical officer and nurse is on duty, said a statement from the office of the surgeon general and wherever possible medical personnel is being recruited to assist army doctors.

It was said that despite the alarming increase in influenza cases, the pneumonia rate continues low, reorts showing the recomonia has developed in only one of every thirteen cases.
