WILSON SUBMITS VITAL QUESTIONS TO GERMANY.

Washington, Oct. 8.—The following note, in the nature of a preliminary reply to Germany's request for an armistice and peace negotiations was handed today to the Swiss charge here:

"Sir: I have the honor to acknowledge, on behalf of the president your note of October 6th, enclosing the communication from the German government to the president; and I am instructed by the president to request you to make the following communication to the imperial German chancellor: 'Before making reply to the request of the imperial German government, and in order that reply shall be candid and straightforward as the momentous interests involved require the president of the United States deems it necessary to assure himself of the exact meaning of the terms laid down by the president in his address to the congress of the United States on the 8th of January last, and in subsequent addresses, and that its object in entering into discussions would be only to agree upon the practical details of their application?'

"The president feels bound to say with regard to the suggestion of an armistice that he would not feel at liberty to propose a cessation of arms to the governments with which the government of the United States is associated against the central powers, so long as the armies of those powers are upon their soil. The good faith of any discussion would manifestly depend upon the consent of the central powers immediately to withdraw their forces everywhere from invaded territory. The president also feels that he is justified in asking whether the imperial chancellor is speaking merely for the constituted authorities of the empire who have so far conducted the war. He deems the answer to these questions vital from every point of view. Accept, sir, the renewed assurances of my high consideration."

CLEAR ROAD TO BERLIN BEFORE EFFECTING PEACE.

New York, Oct. 8.—The attitude of the American Federation of Labor towards the new German peace proposal is set forth in the following statement by John R. Alpine, acting president of the federation, telegraphed here from Washington to the American Alliance for Labor and Democracy which made it public.

"The American Federation of Labor believes that the recent peace overtures from the imperial German government are in keeping with all other proposals of a similar character that have been previously submitted.

"The voice of the American labor movement tells us to ignore these peace overtures and to batter away at the enemy lines until the road is cleared to Berlin and a peace then effected that will last for all time and rid the world of the evils that have beset us for over four years.

"The workers of our country refuse to be deluded by what we believe to be this last attempt to deceive. We want that the world should be rid of the iron heel and the mailed fist. We want peace but we want such a peace as will insure freedom and democracy for all the world and for all time.

"Like the men on the firing line, our workers at home are extending themselves to limit of human endurance to the end that a glorious and lasting peace shall result.

"There can be no peace except such a peace as has been enunciated by the president of our country. When he declares the time at hand for peace negotiations the workers will be with him in word and deed just as they have been from the beginning."

An Endorsement of Kinkaid.

Frank A. Harrison, the well known newspaper correspondent, in speaking of Congressman M. P. Kinkaid says:

"I spent part of last winter in Washington, and met many congressmen and public men. Among them all Kinkaid has the reputation of being the most industrious member of the house.

"Personal observation confirmed this. He spends every day and part of the night in work for his district. Every request is attended personally. This leads him to visit one or more government departments every day. In the departments he is the best known man in Washington, and he gets more results. The people of the Sixth district would be foolish indeed to dispense with his services, and I don't believe they are foolish."

German Army Going to Pieces.

Germany's plan for an armistice is founded it is officially believed, upon recognition in Berlin of the fact that German army organization in France is slowly disintegrating under the campaign of Marshal Foch.

These officers regard the move of the German Chancellor as a desperate eleventh hour attempt to escape serious military disaster and they would not be surprised if President Wilson's condition that there can be no talk of an armistice except when coupled with agreement to withdraw immediately from all invaded territory were promptly accepted.

The answer to such a move, it was suggested, would be to leave to Marshal Foch the dictation of the terms of the armistice should the situation ever reach that stage, as the supreme commander can be trusted to see that no military advantage to the enemy might result. In the meantime, Marshal Foch hour by hour is surrounding the German forces with new perils.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 5th, A. D. 1918:

A JOINT RESOLUTION to amend

Section one (1) of Article seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska:

Section 1. That Section One of Article Seven of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be and the same hereby is amended by striking out the following words:

"Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have declared their intention to become citizens conformably to the laws of the United States, on the subject of naturalization, at least thirty days prior to an election."

And inserting in the place of the words so stricken, the following words:

"Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have become citizens of the United States by naturalization or otherwise conformably to the laws of the United States at least thirty days prior to an election."

Sec. 2. That at the general election nineteen hundred and eighteen (1918) there shall be submitted to the electors of the state for their approval or rejection the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage. At such election, on the ballot of each elector voting for or against said proposed amendment, shall be written or printed the words: "For proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage." and "Against said proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage."

Sec. 3. If such amendment shall be approved by a majority of all electors voting at such election, said amendment shall constitute Section One (1) Article Seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.
