### Cambria Is Taken.

The formidable German defense system between Cambria and St. Quentin has been utterly demolished and British, American and French troops are out in the open country eastward in pursuit of the retreating enemy. Cambria, the pivotal point in the former line and over which there has been so much bitter fighting, is in British hands; numerous villages and hamlets to the south have been overrun by the allies and thousands of Germans have been made prisoners and hundreds of their guns captured. The victory seemingly is a complete one, and with General Foch's strategy working smoothly in bending back the German line in one great converging movement, the Germans apparently are in a serious predicament. From the region northwest of Rheims to the Meuse river, north of Verdun the French and Americans are slowly but surely pushing the Germans back toward the Belgian border.

### The Nebraska Corn Crop.

The October 1 crop report issued by the bureau of crop estimates and Nebraska board of agriculture thru the offices of A. E. Anderson and E. R. Danielson, forecasts a corn crop of 147,470,000 bushels, compared to 249,489,000 bushels last year and the ten year average of 175,223,000 bushels. The reduction is due to drought and a smaller acreage this year. While the killing frost came earlier than usual the damage therefrom was negligible. As stated last month, the damage from drought is confined largely to the southeastern quarter of the state with the other sections ranging from fair to very good. The condition of corn for the United States is 68.6 per cent, compared with 67.4 per cent last month. The indicated production is 2,719,676,000 bushels compared to 3,159,494,000 bushels last year and 2,761,252,000 bushels for the ten year average.

### \$64 a Day.

Sixty-four dollars for eight hours work was the record established by one riveter at the South Chicago ship building yard Sunday. The week day scale for each rivet is eight cents and on Sunday this is raised to sixteen cents. Three men in a team last Sunday drove 1,014 rivets, for which they were paid \$162.24. The share of Hugh McNulty, the driver, was \$64, while his two helpers split the balance.

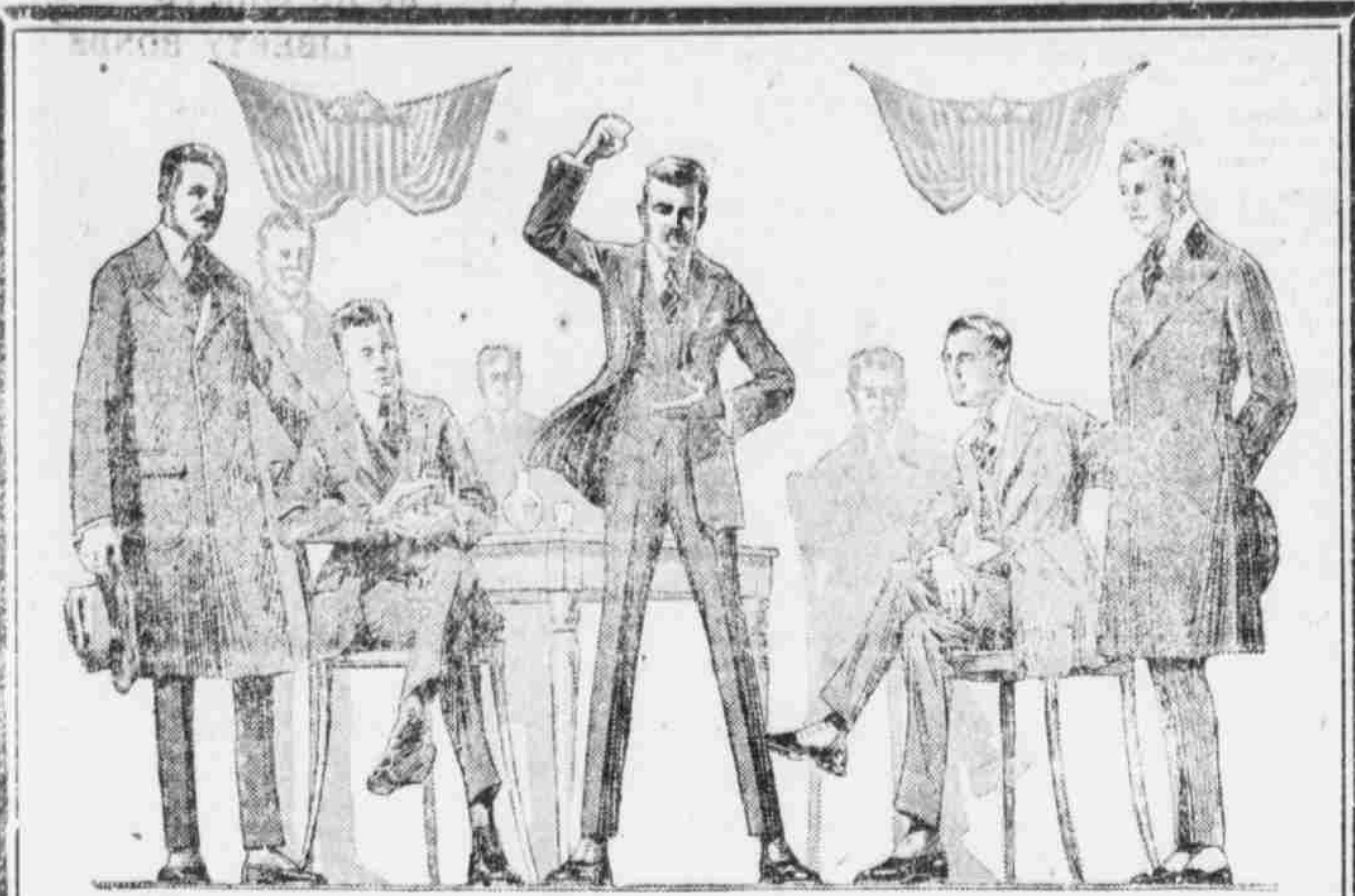

### ELECTION PROCLAMATION

#### For the Year 1918.

By virtue of the authority in me vested, and by the direction of the laws of the State of Nebraska in such case made and provided, I, A. S. Allen, County Clerk of Lincoln County, Nebraska, do hereby proclaim that on Tuesday, the fifth day of November 1918, during the hours designated by law, there will be held a general election at the usual voting places in said County for the election of the following officers, to-wit:

- One United States Senator
- One Governor
- One Lieutenant Governor
- One Secretary of State
- One Auditor of Public Accounts
- One State Treasurer
- One Attorney General
- One Superintendent of Public Instruction

One Commissioner of Public Lands and Buildings

One Railway Commissioner

Two Regents of the State University

One Member of Congress, Sixth Congressional District

One State Senator, Twenty-fifth District

One State Representative, Sixty-eighth District

One State Representative, Seventy-seventh District

Three Judges of the Supreme Court

One County Clerk

One County Treasurer

One County Sheriff

One County Attorney

One County Surveyor

One County Judge

One County Superintendent of Public Instruction

One County Commissioner, Second District

One Assessor for each Precinct

One Road Overseer for each Road District

Two Justices of the Peace for each Precinct

One Police Magistrate, City of North Platte

At the same time and places, two amendments to the constitution of the State will be submitted to the electors for adoption or rejection, to-wit:

Proposed constitutional amendment relating to the right of suffrage as to persons of foreign birth.

For be against calling a constitutional convention to alter, change and amend the constitution of Nebraska; and amendments to the constitution to be submitted concurrently to the electors when demanded by twenty-five percent of the duly qualified and elected delegates of such convention.

Polls will be open at 8 o'clock a. m. and remain open until 4 o'clock a. m. of the same day.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and seal of the County of Lincoln, State of Nebraska, this 29th day of October, 1918.
