At a public meeting held at the court house square Tuesday evening the following resolution was unaninously adopted:

Whereas, the result of armed conlicts for the past three months he-ween the Allied powers and German apon the bloody fields of France and n the Balkin states, has been to bring. at bay the haughty rulers of the Gernan Empire; and

Whereas, the German Government has accepted the terms of peace as numerated by Presisent Wilson; and Whereas, the President has now notified the German Government that the arbitary power which has hereta-

ore been lodged in the Emperor of Germany to disturb the peace of the world, will have to be, either, entired destroyed or made impotent before sence can be made with Germany; Therefore, be it resolved by the citizens of Lincoln County, Nebraska, at a public meeting assembled that we eartily endorse such stand taken by President Wilson in his late reply to the communication of the German Government:

Be it further resolved that an unconditional surrender of the armies of the Central Powers and of Turkey must be brought about and that no compromise ought to be accepted. That a copy of these resolutions be cent to the President. Following the adoption of the reso-



11. The Seed Analysis Branch of the Pure Food Department has, during Governor Neville's administration, made more than 5,000 seed tests, without cost to the farmers of Nebraska.

Being advised that there was a shortage of hog cholera serum and virus, and that Nebraska hog raisers were experiencing difficulty in securing prompt delivery of the product, Governor Neville recommended to the Regents of the State University, that the state serum plant be reopened. The Regents acted favorably upon the Governor's recommendation, and immediately directed the reopening of the plant.

13. Prohibition has been energetically enforced throughout the State. There have been 4,527 prosecutions and fines have been assessed aggregating \$125,000,00.
