**FINAL GERMAN DEFENSE LINE NO EASY NUT TO CRACK.**

The following article, prepared by the Associated Press gives some light on the defensive system Germany has prepared to resist invasion of the Fatherland by the allied armies.

Events of the past three months, involving the ebb of the German tide of invasion in France and Belgium, have emphasized the importance of the German defensive systems which have been prepared by the foe for just the emergency which now confronts him. The German defensive lines resemble a tree with three main branches. The trunk of this "tree" has its root at the Swiss frontier and continues north as far as Metz, where it divides into two branches. The westerly branch runs to the northwest as far as the Meuse river, where it separates, one "limb" crossing the Meuse and running westward, after which it sweeps to the north on a long curve. The other follows the Meuse, down as far as Namur, whence it runs to Brussels and Antwerp and thence to the Dutch frontier.

The branch that crosses the Meuse is the first that must be broken by the allies. In fact, recent British and Belgian victories in Belgian Flanders seem to have rendered a large part of this line untenable as a permanent defensive position.

**First Big Gamble to Run.**  
 This line crosses the Meuse at Dinant, goes thru Argonne forest and then follows the Aisne river as far as Reuilly, where it turns north and passes near Guise and Solesmes. It continues northward past Valenciennes and reaches the Scheldt at Conde. It runs along the Scheldt past Tournai and Ghent, where it turns to the eastward and passes the Antwerp. This is the "Hunding line."

The second line, known as the "line of the Meuse," is established on the east bank of the Meuse river northward from Dinant. It passes Sedan and Mezieres and enters Belgium just to the southwest of Dinant. At Namur it leaves the river and runs to Brussels, continuing on to Antwerp, where it joins the "Hunding line" and continues on to the Dutch border.

The third line is the original defense zone along the German frontier. South of Metz it is centered around the thirty-seven permanent forts about Strasbourg. It runs over the high and precipitous hills on the Vosges mountains and is several miles deep.

At Metz the German have constructed twenty-eight great forts, which are so located as to command all approaches and at the same time be capable of concentrating their fire on any one fort which happens to be entered by the allies.

**Fortress Around Iron Fields.**  
 Northwest of Metz are the great iron fields of Briey. The importance of this iron deposit has compelled the Germans to convert the whole country there into a veritable fortress. This line runs along the boundary between France and Germany, bending to the northeast until it reaches the Luxembourg line. If this belt should be pierced, the Germans may fall back to the Saarbruecken and Kaiserslautern regions, which are interspersed by rivers and high wooded hills, which lend themselves admirably to defensive operations.

East of Luxembourg, it is reported, the Germans have devoted a great deal of time and labor to the construction of permanent fortifications.

The country along the Belgian frontier between Luxembourg and Holland is dominated by Goblens, which Marshal Foch considers the key to Germany. In this area is Bonn, a fortress of the first class; Cologne, which is protected by a broad belt of entrenchments and a series of strongholds running along the western side of the Rhine until that river passes into Holland.

**Then Comes the Rhine.**  
 Should the three lines mentioned be broken, or if the allies should break thru between Metz and the Swiss frontier the Germans would be compelled to fall into Germany proper, or to the south, to cross the Rhine. This historic river is really the western moat of the Teutonic castle. Its whole eastern bank is strongly fortified, and would be capable of a protracted defense. This line of resistance begins at Lahr and runs down the Rhine thru Offenburr, Rastatt, Karlsruhe, Mannheim, Darmstadt, Weibaden, Bendorf, Kalk, Densburg and Wesel.

In their retirement from their present positions the German plan will be to shorten their line materially and thus increase the number of men available for resistance along their new fronts. The Hunding line is about seventy miles shorter than the Hindenburg system. The line of the Meuse would shorten the front by twenty miles more, while the Germans, if they should retire to their own frontier would still be able to shorten their front by thirty-five miles.

This shortening of the line will be of tremendous importance in future operations by the allies. It would make up to a large degree for the heavy losses inflicted upon the Germans during the campaign of the past summer and give them man power that would be a formidable barrier to the allied advance.

The Meuse the Aisne and the Scheldt rivers and the canals in Belgium in the vicinity of Brussels and Antwerp will also be valuable adjuncts to the conduct of defensive fighting by the Germans. With the development of the tanks as an offensive weapon, a river as a first defense line adds tremendously to the strength of a position.

**ALL NEBRASKA IS UNDER QUARANTINE FOR INFLUENZA.**

The latest ruling made by the state board of health closes all schools in Nebraska, city as well as country, all theaters, all churches, cancels all lodge and society meetings and public gatherings of every nature, both in doors and out. Local health authorities are urged to enforce these rulings. The quarantine will remain in force until Sunday, November 3 and has been decided upon as being the most effective way to fight the Spanish influenza.

The order banished says that "the disease is of an especially virulent form and that immediate and drastic measures must be taken to combat its spread if the health and life of our people is to be conserved. The state board of health report that there are about twenty thousand cases of the influenza in Nebraska today and Dr. W. S. Wild is authority for the statement that the disease is bringing down an increased number of people daily.

People are warned against letting their children run about on the streets and thus expose themselves needlessly. Those having a member of the household down with the influenza should also take especial precautions and not expose others needlessly to the disease. Much grief and suffering can be avoided if the public will do its part and rigidly observe the quarantine ruling.

**Obituary.**

The funeral service of Mrs. Sarah C. Moore was held at the home of the deceased, 815 W. 2nd St., North Platte, Sunday October 20th, 1918 at 10 a. m. The Rev. H. E. Hess, of the First Methodist Church preached the funeral sermon and music was furnished by a mixed quartet from the Methodist church.

Even though our city is under the pall of a dreaded epidemic many of her friends attended the funeral, most of them sitting on chairs arranged in rows on the lawn.

The deceased, Sarah C. Griffith, was born in Harrison Co., Indiana, April 29th, 1843. In 1859 she was married to Rev. Ramon C. Moore who was later to become a Lieut. Colonel in the Civil war. Of their six children, Clarence G., Thomas R., Grace M., and Harry E., are living. Mrs. Moore quickly and peacefully passed away during the night of Oct. 18th, 1918.

Since the time of their marriage, excepting the period of the war, she followed her husband as a successful and beloved minister's wife until their retirement in 1904. In 1869 they moved to Illinois where he preached for ten years then took pastorate in Kansas. In 1891 her husband was transferred to the West Nebraska Conference and held successive pastorates at Clay Center, Elsie, Elwood, Sidney and in the year 1899 moved to North Platte when he was appointed Presiding Elder of the North Platte District. In 1903 he held the North Platte circuit for one year and then retired.

He passed away January 27th, 1909 and she lived in their home until her death. Her son Thomas R. Moore has made North Platte his home for 20 years. A faithful christian mother and wife has gone and we shall miss her cheerful presence in the home and church.

**Len Kidwell Married.**

An item of news that should have had the attention of the Winner last week was the marriage of Mr. Len Kidwell of this place and Mrs. Elizabeth Rogers at the home of the latter in Kearney, Wednesday, October 24. And there is a bit of romance connected with the affair too, for Mrs. Rogers, now Mrs. Kidwell, was an early resident of this vicinity, being the wife of Ben Rogers, a homesteader here and both will be remembered by the many old timers who read this paper. The death of Mr. Rogers and the former Mrs. Kidwell occurred only thirteen days apart, the two families were great friends in the early days and it seems not inappropriate that the two who are left should be thus united. Their many friends, old and new, will wish them a full measure of happiness for the future.—Wallace Winner.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 5th, A. D. 1918:

**A JOINT RESOLUTION** to amend Section one (1) of Article seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska:

Section 1. That Section One of Article Seven of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be and the same hereby is amended by striking out the following words:

"Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have declared their intention to become citizens conformably to the laws of the United States, on the subject of naturalization, at least thirty days prior to an election."

And inserting in the place of the words so stricken, the following words:

"Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have become citizens of the United States by naturalization or otherwise conformably to the laws of the United States at least thirty days prior to an election."

Sec. 2. That at the general election nineteen hundred and eighteen (1918) there shall be submitted to the electors of the state for their approval or rejection the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage. At such election, on the ballot of each elector voting for or against said proposed amendment, shall be written or printed the words: "For proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage," and "Against said proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage."

Sec. 3. If such amendment shall be approved by a majority of all electors voting at such election, said amendment shall constitute Section One (1) Article Seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.
