A., the K. of C., the Jewish Welfare Board, the War Camp Community Service, the American Library Association and the Salvation Army are asking for \$170,500,000 from Americans "over here" that they may provide comforts for the American boys "over there."

**AMERICA UNITED TO PROVIDE COMFORT TO OUR SOLDIERS**

WAR WORK CAMPAIGN NOV. 11-18 TO RAISE GIGANTIC FUND FOR SEVEN WELFARE SOCIETIES.

America united in one vast, all-embracing organization for the sole purpose of service to our fighting men to raise their morale and strengthen their arms for a speedy victory is the objective of the United War Work campaign for funds during the week of November 11-18. President Wilson has called upon all men and women who love America to stand together and merge their strength in the united campaign for supporting our soldiers and sailors.

That Americans will be a unit in upholding the men in arms with full financial backing for soldier welfare work is forecast by the speed and single-mindedness with which the seven great war work organizations, at the request of the President, merged their drives into the United War Work campaign for the week of November 11-18. The organizations united in this work are the National War Work Council of the Y. M. C. A., War Work Council of the Y. W. C. A., the National Catholic War Council (K. of C.), the Jewish Welfare Board, the War Camp Community Service, the American Library Association and the Salvation Army. With the endorsement of the government they are seeking a combined fund of \$170,500,000 to continue the great war work for our fighting men in camp, on the seas and in the war zone.

The combination of the Young Men's Christian Association, the Young Women's Christian Association, the National Catholic War Council, including the Knights of Columbus, the War Camp Community Service, Jewish Welfare Board and Salvation Army in a common appeal for funds with which to carry on the war work of these organizations, was effected at the direct suggestion of President Wilson. In a letter which the President wrote on September 5th to Raymond B. Fosdick, Chairman of the War and Navy Department Commissions on Training Camp Activities, under which these seven organizations are co-ordinated for welfare work to aid in sustaining the morale of our men on this side and overseas, he proposed a unification of effort in the campaign.

**Nebraska Has Loaned; Now It Plans To Give.**

The state of Nebraska has loaned over \$204,000,000 to the United States government in a little over a year. This great sum of money will be returned to them with interest in due time.

In the same period the people have only given \$4,500,000 for the comfort and welfare of the boys in service. There should be no difficulty therefore in raising \$2,000,000 during the United War Work campaign of November 11-18.

**Nebraska's Quota Cares For Nebraska's Days.**

When the people of Nebraska give their money to the United War Work campaign beginning November 11, they will be giving directly to the comfort of Nebraska boys in battle-field and camp. Uncle Sam's army is made up of boys in proportion to the population of every state.

The quota for United War Work of the seven great war organizations is also divided in accordance with the population of each state. Every state must furnish its full quota because every state's boys must be cared for. It is actually furnishing comforts for your own boy and the "boy next door" when you give to the United campaign.

**Peace Will Not End Need of Comfort for Boys Kept "Over There."**

The great campaign for United War Work is planned to care for America's soldiers for the next year, no matter when the war ends, the same needs for safeguarding and caring for our soldiers abroad will exist for months and months.

War department officials have given assurance that it will be two years after actual warfare ceases before our armies can be returned to our own soil. The seven great national organizations doing war work with soldiers will need all the money they can get even after the final details of peace are worked out.

During the time the boys are waiting to come home they will be restless. Freed from action, they will need the united efforts of the seven organizations combining for the United War Work campaign as a source of comfort and cheer as never before.

**Mothers in Nebraska to Bring Home Joys to Their Sons in Khaki.**

Mothers' heart strings are being stretched thousands of miles these days—sons have joined the colors and left their homes. American women are giving their very dearest and nearest—they are giving their strength and time that their boys may win in the great effort for humanity.

President Wilson says, "This war could not have been fought without the women." In saying this he realizes that 1,500,000 women are working in munition plants and millions of others are doing their "bit" for war work. Jew, Gentile, Protestant and Catholic are fighting side by side in the front-line trenches—mothers, daughters, sisters and sweethearts are working side by side over here.

The women's committee of the United War Work campaign is making one great united effort—they cannot fight, but they can get behind the fighters. What better can any woman do now than work with one of the seven great organizations that are making homes behind the lines?

Every woman can do her part now. If she doesn't know what to do ask a friend who belongs to the Y. M. C. A., Y. W. C. A., National Catholic War Council, Jewish Welfare Board, War Camp Community Service, American Library Association or Salvation Army. A member of any of these organizations will gladly welcome your aid in the great drive November 11 to 18 for \$170,500,000. This great sum

is to be used for our boys in the trenches and camps—to take a "bit of home to them."

Nebraska women have gone "over the top" in every effort. Every mother's son, fighting for the United States of America, will be benefited by the results of the United War Work campaign. The women of this state must not be listed among the slackers at this time, nor will they.

**Uniting War Work Makes It Easy To Give.**

Instead of seven separate campaigns in Nebraska for the 1919 funds needed by the Y. M. C. A., Y. W. C. A., K. of C., Jewish Welfare Board, War Camp Community Service, American Library Association and Salvation Army, there will be one big drive on November 11-18. President Wilson, who is responsible for the consolidated drive, rightly thought that the people would rather give a larger amount once, than a smaller amount seven different times. Will Nebraska do her part? Just watch what we do to that \$2,000,000 quota.

**Governor and Prominent Citizens Asked to Boost United War Work.**

Governor Neville is to be asked by the state committee to issue a proclamation in regard to the United War Work campaign. Each mayor also will be requested to issue a proclamation.

The state committee has stated that it will also ask each newspaper in Nebraska to secure and publish ten statements from the biggest men in each community, pointing out what a great service the seven agencies of the United War Work campaign are rendering to the soldiers and what a wonderful thing for the country the United War Work campaign is.

Nebraska is wide awake and eager on this United War Work campaign business. A squadron of speakers is being secured by the state headquarters to talk in behalf of the seven participating organizations, the Y. M. C. A., the Y. W. C. A., National Catholic War Council (K. of C.), the Jewish Welfare Board, the War Camp Community Service, the American Library Association, and the Salvation Army.

Boys and girls as well as men and women are glad and eager to do their part in the United War Work campaign. A boys' and girls' division, known as the "Victory Boys" and "Victory Girls," has been organized. The object of this campaign among the boys and girls is to enroll at least \$2,000 boys and girls in Nebraska to "earn and give" \$5, if possible. This will provide the comforts of all seven organizations to one soldier for five weeks.

Nebraska is called upon to give \$2,000,000 during the week of November 11-18, to meet the needs of the seven United War Work organizations. Every one of these workers fills a unique place. The amount called for will be met by Nebraska just as sure as the day and date is setting for the drive to commence.

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**ELECTION PROCLAMATION For the Year 1918.**

By virtue of the authority in me vested, and by the direction of the laws of the State of Nebraska in such case made and provided, I, A. S. Allen, County Clerk of Lincoln County, Nebraska, do hereby proclaim that on Tuesday, the fifth day of November 1918, during the hours designated by law, there will be held a general election at the usual voting places in said County for the election of the following officers, to-wit:

- One United States Senator
- One Governor
- One Lieutenant Governor
- One Secretary of State
- One Auditor of Public Accounts
- One State Treasurer
- One Attorney General
- One Superintendent of Public Instruction
- One Commissioner of Public Lands and Buildings
- One Railway Commissioner
- Two Regents of the State University
- One Member of Congress, Sixth Congressional District
- One State Senator, Twenty-fifth District
- One State Representative, Sixty-eighth District
- One State Representative, Seventy-seventh District
- Three Judges of the Supreme Court

- One County Sheriff
- One County Attorney
- One County Surveyor
- One County Judge
- One County Superintendent of Public Instruction
- One County Commissioner, Second District
- One Assessor for each Precinct
- One Road Overseer for each Road District
- Two Justices of the Peace for each Precinct
- One Police Magistrate, City of North Platte

At the same time and places, two amendments to the constitution of the State will be submitted to the electors for adoption or rejection, to-wit:

Proposed constitutional amendment relating to the right of suffrage as to persons of foreign birth.

For or against calling a constitutional convention to alter, change and amend the constitution of Nebraska; any amendments to the constitution to be submitted separately to the electors when demanded by twenty-five percent of the duly qualified and elected delegates of such convention.

Polls will be open at 8 o'clock a. m., and remain open until 8 o'clock p. m., of the same day.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 5th, A. D. 1918:

**A JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Section one (1) of Article seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.**

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska:

Section 1. That Section One of Article Seven of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be and the same hereby is amended by striking out the following words:

"Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have declared their intention to become citizens conformably to the laws of the United States, on the subject of naturalization, at least thirty days prior to an election."

And inserting in the place of the words so stricken, the following words:

"Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have become citizens of the United States by naturalization or otherwise conformably to the laws of the United States at least thirty days prior to an election."

Sec. 2. That at the general election nineteen hundred and eighteen (1918) there shall be submitted to the electors of the state for their approval or rejection the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage. At such election, on the ballot of each elector voting for or against said proposed amendment, shall be written or printed the words: "For proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage," and "Against said proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage."

Sec. 3. If such amendment shall be approved by a majority of all electors voting at such election, said amendment shall constitute Section One (1) Article Seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.
