Entente di plomats and army and naval experts, after examination of the Austrian terms, agreed that the German terms will compel acceptance by that government of a dictated peace

They expect that the German terms will be made public within the next two days and that they will include: Demobilizations of the German army with the surrender of most war

Demobilization of the German fleet with the surrender to allied control of all battle creisers, super-submarines, half of the dreadnoughts and

certain other naval units. Surrender of Helgoland and its docks and defenses to the allies, together with control by allies of both ends of the Kiel canal

Evacuation of all occupied territory east and west, and dismantling of the Rhine forts. Free movement for allied vessels or

All aircraft to be concentrated and half of it turned over to the allies. Complete evacuation of Alsace-Lor-

Immediate surrender of all prisoners of war without reciprocity. The terms will be such, as M. Ansing forward east and west of the dre Tardieu pointed out on Sunday, as "to make Germany confess that she
