

## JIM CLINTON UNDER SHELL FIRE FOR TEN DAYS.

Writing to his parents under date of October 10th, Jim Clinton says in part: "I have just come out of the lines and experienced the worst fight the marines have had. Our division is doing duty with the French, so we made an attack on a place the French had been unable to take. It was full of machine gun nests—we took it but it was costly. We were in the lines for ten days, didn't have a chance to shave, so you can imagine how I looked upon my return. The only clothing I took off in two days were my helmet and overcoat. We slept in trenches, woods and dugouts.

We are anxiously awaiting peace publication. Everyone here prays for it. Those at home can't imagine the hell we go through in the scraps we have been having. Saw "Pop" Sturges this afternoon, so I am going to "split a bottle" with him tonight.

In a letter dated a couple of days later Jim writes he was feeling more cheerful since resting up some distance back of the line. He saw Doug Fairbanks in "Mahnattan Madassa" at the movies. He says he has certainly toured France on hobnails since his first arrival there. "Pop" Sturges evidently has charge of postal affairs at A. F. O. 710, as Jim directs his mail to be sent in Sturges' care.

## DOOM OF HUN ARMY IS NEAR AT HAND.

Germany, deserted by her allies, is apparently facing great disaster on the western front, and now there is a great possibility that Germany's military doom is not far distant. This crisis has arisen during the last three days. American and French attacks west of the Meuse river, which had seemed to be gaining but little apparently sapped the strength of the enemy. When the break came on Saturday it took on aspects of a rout rather than an orderly retirement.

Smashing blows are being dealt the Germans and the collapse of the present enemy defense positions appear close at hand.

It now appears that the Germans who have been holding the line running westward thru the Champagne country cannot retreat eastward, but must be diverted northward thru Belgium. This will add many weary miles to the length of the journey that seemingly must be begun at once.

On the northern end of the front in France, Field Marshal Haig on Monday morning launched a new attack south of the Scheldt in the region of Valenciennes. The operation began successfully on a wide front and this vital sector of the German positions is in great peril.

The French army maintains its pressure, but fighting activity is less than on Sunday and last week. German artillery has been active along the Aisne front, probably protecting an enemy retirement, which is inevitable in view of the allied success north and east.

General Pershing's armies are pressing forward east and west of the Meuse.

**Mrs. Blalock Passes Away.**  
Mrs. Lucinda Blalock, wife of W. F. Blalock and mother of W. H. Blalock, of this city, died at the home of her daughter in DeMoss, Oregon, Sunday, this intelligence being conveyed in a message received yesterday morning. Mrs. Blalock left several months ago to visit her daughter in Oregon, hoping that a change of climate would benefit her health. She apparently died suddenly for a letter received a few days ago stated that her health was normal. The deceased was past eighty years of age. Interment will be made at DeMoss.

## GERMANY'S FATE AS A MILITARY NATION SEALED.

Germany's fate as a military nation is sealed.

Publication yesterday afternoon of the Austro-Hungarian armistice terms conclusively proved this. The terms that will be accorded Germany and which she must accept voluntarily or have forced on her in the very near future, will be equally drastic with those which have disarmed the forces of Emperor Charles.

Entente diplomats and American army and naval experts, after examination of the Austrian terms, agreed that the German terms will compel acceptance by that government of a dictated peace.

They expect that the German terms will be made public within the next two days and that they will include: Demobilization of the German army with the surrender of most war materials.

Demobilization of the German fleet with the surrender to allied control of all battle cruisers, super-submarines, half of the dreadnoughts and certain other naval units.

Surrender of Helgoland and its docks and defenses to the allies, together with control by allies of both ends of the Kiel canal.

Evacuation of all occupied territory, east and west, and dismantling of the Rhine forts.

Free movement for allied vessels on the inland German waterways.

All aircraft to be concentrated and half of it turned over to the allies.

Complete evacuation of Alsace-Lorraine.

Immediate surrender of all prisoners of war without reciprocity.

The terms will be such, as M. Andre Tardieu pointed out on Sunday, as "to make Germany confess that she is beaten."

The American Red Cross has been asked by the War Industries Board to collect 5,000 tons of tin and the Lincoln County Chapter has asked the Junior Red Cross to collect one ton in Lincoln county. The tin will be sold for the benefit of the Red Cross and the nation will get the needed tin. Friends of the Red Cross should save tin foil, lead foil, tea lead, toothpaste tubes, pewter objects, etc. A Junior Red Cross boy or girl will collect these and see that they are turned in to the proper place for the ton of tin.
